Authority

Administration of Authority.

2/19/85 Dr. Donald Ward Since Adam, man has had a problem with the administration of and the submission to authority.

One of the main problems with the administration of authority today is inconsistency. In the supermarket you see parents loving their sweet little children one minute, then twisting the ear of a screaming little brat the next minute.

Considerations of administering authority.

- 1. You cannot always go by your wife's emotions in how you administer authority, but you can always go by the Word of God.
 - A. <u>Jer 17:9</u> The human heart is deceitful above all things, who can know it?
 - B. <u>II Cor 10:7</u> We should look on the heart as God does -- not on the outward appearance.
- 2. Tyranny leads to revolution leads to anarchy leads to tyranny etc.
- 3. God is the author of true, just government.
- 4. If a man finds his authority being questioned and/or rebelled against, he should first look at himself to see what he is doing wrong.

Proper Administration of Authority.

- 1. We have the opportunity to administer God's authority.
 - A. I Cor 11:2-3 The head of the woman is the man, just as the head over Christ is God the Father.
 - B. Gen 1:26 Male and female created He them (not androgynist). Authority is given to the husband from God. It is God's authority, not man's. If we stray past the bounds that God has set, we are taking authority which we do not have and God will not back us up.
 - C. I Cor 11:4 If a man wears his hair too long, he dishonors Christ. If a woman wears her hair too short, she dishonors her husband and Christ.

Authority

Administration of Authority.

- 2. The basis for administering authority should be agape love.
 - A. Matt 20:26 "minister" = <diakonos> = one who runs through the dust for others (for our wife).
 - B. Authority must be administered through true, agape, or spiritual God-like love.
 - C. Agape love is measured by our willingness to give ourselves as a living sacrifice. To become a living sacrifice, we must lay down our lives for others (our wives). This does not mean running into a burning building to save her, but being willing to let our attitudes and our ego die for the benefit our our wife and family.
 - D. \underline{Jn} 15:12-13 This is the greatest love that can be given.
 - E. <u>Jn 3:16</u> God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son.
 - F. Eph 5:1-2 Christ gave His life willingly. We need to follow His example.
 - G. vs 23-25 The husband is the head of the wife, and is the savior of his wife's body (spiritual leader of the family), just as Christ gave himself for the Church.
 - H. vs 28-33 Husband is to love his wife as he loves himself. "Reverence" = deeply respect.
 - I. I Pet 5:3 We are examples to the flock (family).
- 3. We must first examine and humble ourselves to grow toward perfect authority.
 - A. Only those who can live under authority are fit to administer authority.
 - B. Only those who submit to authority can truly understand faith (God will deliver).
 - C. I Pet 3:18-23 When we are buffeted for our faults (something we didn't do), we are to take it patiently like Christ did.

Administration of Authority.

- 1. $\frac{\text{vs } 19}{\text{(grace)}}$ "thankworthy" = <charis> = favor
- 2. Most marriages have the "Because Syndrome".
 "I don't have to follow him, because he
 isn't doing his part."
- D. We as husbands must have a solid relationship with God in order to have a solid relationship with our wives.
 - 1. Phip 2:5 "let this mind be in you that was also in Christ Jesus".
 - 2. vs 6-8 "Made no reputation of himself. . . Took upon himself the form of a servant. Was obedient even unto death."
- E. Moses was the meekest man to ever live and probably had the most responsibility ever given to one man (up until that time) [Num 12:3].
 - 1. Ex 3:3 "Who am I that I should have authority over the wife?
 - 2. Phip 2:3 Esteem others better than self.
 - 3. Num 20:7-12 The only recorded time that Moses took authority into his own hands (instead of God's) and it cost him being able to go into the promised land.

2/21/85 Dr. Ward

- 4. The husband must be the leader in reconciliation.
 - A. II Cor 5:19-20 Reconciliation. Jesus Christ died so that we could be reconciled to God. We need to give up our pride, ego, attitudes, etc., so that we can be reconciled to God and each other.
 - B. I Jn 4:19 We love Him because He first loved us. How can we love Christ, who we can't see, if we don't love our brother (wife) who we can see?
 - C. Eph 4:26 Let not the sun go down upon your wrath. **Make sure that you are one spiritually and mentally before you are one physically.
 - D. <u>Jn 13:14-17</u> Serving attitude; feet washing; concern for others. Happy are they who do them.

Authority

Administration of Authority.

- 5. The husband must provide his wife's physical and spiritual needs.
 - A. The man must watch his manner of expression in the little things (tenderness, kindness, etc.).
 - 1. Read What Wives Wish Their Husbands Knew About Women." by Dobsen.
 - 2. "To women, sex is the opera; to men, it is the intermission."
 - 3. Man thinks about love only when he is home; women think about it all the time ("You're going to the ball game instead of taking me shopping? You don't love me anymore!")
 - 4. Eph 5:29 No man hates his own flesh. Husband and wife are one flesh.
 - B. The husband must be the spiritual leader.
 - 1. Rom 9:3 So often the husband is not the spiritual leader of the family.
 - 2. The husband must be well educated to lead the family; teach and be an example to the family.
 - C. The husband must provide physical things for the wife/family.
 - 1. Ps 31:10-11 Respect for a virtuous woman.
 - Consider your wife a treasure given by a bountiful God.
 - 3. Express your love everyday. God will bless you for it.
 - D. Don't ever surrender the reigns.
 - 1. Leadership never operates in a vacuum.
 - 2. Silence is a message.
 - Your family will follow your example (good or bad).

Authority

Submission to Authority.

Submission to authority

- 1. Submission is beyond obedience. Obedience you can do by rote, without heart.
- 2. Submission is a frame of mind, a way of life; it is not just put on, but lived. I Pet 3:3-6
- 3. To a wife, honor should not be in submitting to the husband, but to God. The wife must understand who her chief lord is.
 - A. Col 3:22-25 Whatever we do, we must serve God and not man.
 - B. I Pet 3:17 Honor all men, but fear God.
- 4. Marriage is not a master slave relationship
 (Matt 23:1-2).
 - A. I Pet 3:13 Submit to every ordinance of man, for the Lord's sake.
 - B. If your husband does not follow God:
 - 1. Bring up his error (Matt 5:23-25).
 - 2. Talk to the ministry about it. Not his friends, the ministry (Matt 18:15).
 - 3. Do all that you can with your husband and the ministry, then turn your husband over to God. There is nothing as fearful as to be in the hands of the living God.

Understanding the Opposite Sex

3/1/87 Mr. Larry Salyer

There is a difference between the sexes; even though they have the same potential -- to become the very sons of God.

- 1. T.V., movies, careers, etc. try to portray that there is no difference between male and female, except for the obvious differences.
- 2. Sex change operations. People try to change the physical instead of changing the attitudes. We should change our minds, not our organs.
- 3. Gen 1:26-27 God made male and female and said that it was good. He made both male and female in His image. Not only the obvious organs, but each cell is different in the male than in the female (hormones, emotions, etc).
- 4. Gen 2:24 "Be one flesh" does not mean androgynist. It means that men and women were made to share their attitude and thought so that they can, as one whole body, have more of God's mind. Male and female complement each other. Neither is complete without the other.
- 5. In order to fulfill God's purpose for us, we must be willing to share the strengths and accept the weaknesses of our mates.
 - A. We must be able to see our own strengths and weaknesses first.
 - B. You cannot see the strengths and weaknesses of your perspective mate on your own; you must have God's help.
- 6. Being one in marriage makes both balanced and helps them to better see a more complete picture of what God really is.
- 7. God has some of the characteristics of both sexes.
- 8. Christ is called both a lion and a lamb. He is able to wield authority as well as submit to it.
- 9. Rom 1:19-20 We can understand the things which are not seen (spiritual), by looking at the things which we can see (physical). We can better understand the relationship of God and Christ, and Christ and the Church through our own marriage.

Marriage Vows

Marriage is a covenant between you, your mate, and God. It was invented by, ordered by, and ordained by God.

The taking of the vows.

God must be involved. If you go to the Justice of the Peace, or do not go to a minister for counselling, you are leaving God out of the picture.

The vows are a promise before God (not just the physical witnesses).

It is a sacred covenant. The vows should not be repeated or altered as part of the marriage ceremony.

The vows are a restatement of the responsibilities and meaning of the marriage relationship.

"lawfully wedded" (State legal as well as by God's laws)

"cleave to her unto death"

cleave: to cling or adhere to. Strong's #1692: abide
fast, ajoin, stick together (bonded together).

"love her, cherish her, honor her, and provide for her."

love: Unselfish concern that freely accepts another
in loyalty, and seeks her good.

cherish: To hold dear, to keep or cultivate with
care and affection; to entertain or harbor in the
mind, deeply and resolutely.

<u>honor</u>: v. to regard or treat with honor or respect. \overline{n} . Honor may apply to the recognition of the title of great respect, or the expression of such recognition.

provide: To supply what is needed for sustenance or support (physically and spiritually).

Marriage Vows

Women: "covenant with God"

"lawfully wedded"

"remainder of your natural life"

"submit yourself to him, as to the Eternal"

<u>submit</u>: To yield to government or authority; to desire to commit yourself to the discretion or judgment of another. The condition of being humble and compliant.

"being subject to him in everything, deeply respect him"

subject: Owing obedience or allegiance to the power
or dominion of another.

deeply respect: to honor (see pg. 18).

Note: The minister is in charge of the wedding ceremony (not the mother-in-law).

Roles in Marriage

3/7/85 Mr. Larry Salyer When we consider marriage, we must not only look at things as they are now and in ten years, but how things will be in 50 years when you are old, gray and crippled.

Roles in Marriage

- A. Husbands and wives.
 - 1. Eph. 5:21-24 We should model our actions and attitudes after those of Christ. This is why there are more scriptures relating to submission, because the Church is to submit. The men also have Christ as an example.
 - vs 25-26 Husbands, love your wives even as Christ loved the Church and gave himself for it. This is an example of outgoing concern for your wife.
 - $\frac{\text{vs } 29-30}{\text{(Gen } 2:24, "...}$ No man has ever hated his own flesh one flesh.")
 - vs 31-33 Love your wife as you love yourself
 (Php 2:3, "Esteem others greater than self.")
 - 2. I Cor 7:1-5 Sexual conduct in marriage.
 - vs 1-2 Let every person have his own mate.
 - \underline{vs} 3 Husband and wife must show appropriate love, affection, etc.
 - vs 4 Sex is commanded as part of the marriage relationship. We can't use sex to get our own way.
 - \underline{vs} 5 You can abstain from sex only as long as you can fast.
- B. Woman's Role in Marriage.
 - 1. Pro 31:10-31 The Virtuous Woman.
 - vs 11 The virtuous woman helps her husband. The husband must give her enough responsibility and trust in order for her to do this effectively. (See the Living Bible).
 - vs 20 She helps the needy.

Roles in Marriage

vs 23 Husband has first done his part, then has a good woman behind him.

vs 30 She has a converted mind.

- C. Men's Roles in Marriage.
 - 1. Matt 20:26 Leading is a serving role (see pg 10).
 - 2. I Tim 5:8 You must provide for your own family first.
 - 3. Col 3:19 Husbands love your wives and be not bitter against them. You are one flesh. You cannot think or say, "If I weren't married to you, I could do this/that."
 - 4. I Pet 3:7 "knowledge" = you must first have knowledge of what you, your mate, and God are. "Giving honor to the wife, as unto the weaker vessel."
 - 5. Pro 11:29 He that troubles his own house shall inherit the wind (or shall end up as nothing).

Growth in Marriage

3/19/85 Mr. Randy Duke

Some people have the goal to get married. When the ceremony is over, that is the extent of their goals. Growth stops at that point because they have no more goals.

Gen 2:24 A man shall leave his mother and father and cleave to his wife, and they shall be one flesh (physically, mentally and spiritually).

<u>Ps 127:1</u> Except the Lord shall build the house, they labor in vain that build it. God must be the foundation of the house.

vs 3 Children are a blessing.

 - A. Matt 22:36 The greatest commandment is to love thy God with all thy heart, soul and mind.
 - B. <u>Luke 18:28</u> Whatever we give up now for God and His Work, will be more than made up in the world to come.
 - C. Acts 5:32 God gives the Holy Spirit to those who obey Him. This is the beginning of emotional maturity.
 - D. I Cor 9:27 We need to straighten ourselves out before we worry about our mates.
 - E. Php 2:5 Let this mind be in you that was also in Christ Jesus.
- 2. Growing in understanding and appreciation for God's government.
 - A. Eph 4:11-12 God gave some "for the perfecting of the saints."
 - B. Eph 5 God's governmental structures are successful because of the attitudes in Eph 4.

Growth in Marriage

- 3. Having our hearts in the Work.
 - A. Mark 1:13 Our work (the work of the Church) is to proclaim the Gospel.
 - B. Practicing God's Gospel in your marriage.
 - 1. Tithing (uplifting attitudes toward).
 - 2. Pro 22:6 Train up a child in the way that he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it.
 - C. Entertaining and fellowshipping as a couple.
- 4. Growth demands continual education.
 - A. Reading together.
 - B. Traveling together.
 - C. Sharing personal interests.
- 5. Provoke one another to good works (lead by husband).
 - A. Study together (sermon notes, Proverbs, etc).
 - B. Do projects together (she watches the newspapers and magazines and goes through the concordance for his sermonettes).
 - C. Pray together. Pray for the direction of the family, protection of the family, and for the Work.
 - D. Constructive criticism.
 - 1. Gal 6:1 Restore one another in a spirit of meekness. Bear one another's burdens.
 - 2. Pro 15:1 A soft answer will turn away wrath.
- 6. Do household chores together (with the kids).
 - 7. Allow sexuality to be an expression of love, concern and appreciation.

- 2. Proper physical attraction.
 - A. The God-ordained purposes of sex (MDS):
 - 1. Reproduction.
 - 2. Marriage.
 - 3. Expression of marital love and companionship.
 - B. Sex appeal.
 - 1. 95 99% of sex appeal is from the neck up.
 - 2. Pro 15:13 A cheerful countenance.

In order to sustain romance, you must be able to sustain enthusiasm, emotions, attitudes, facial expressions, countenance, and the heart.

We must know that we will be able to sustain most of these things with our mate when we are married, and in the future.

We are not talking about the physical features of a person, but the attitude, countenance, character, and personality.

Eyes, hair, and teeth play their part. These are not primary things, but when you let down on personal hygiene and looks, it projects an attitude -- a lack of outgoing concern.

Romance: The excitement, electricity, and enjoyment of being together.

Principles for Sustaining Romance in Marriage.

- 1. Don't take your mate for granted.
 - A. "My mate owes me a good marriage."
 - B. Marriage is not an end.

Sustaining Romance in Marriage

- 2. Always show the utmost respect for your mate (Grooming, manners, conduct, language, etc).
- 3. Never put the affection or approval of another before that of your mate.
 - A. Be more concerned about what your mate thinks than what your boss thinks (within reason).
 - B. Put your wife before parents and in-laws.
- 4. Seek to fulfill your responsibilities in your role.
- 5. Beware of offenses.
 - A. Vulgarity.
 - B. Embarrassments (don't intentionally put a stumbling block in front of your mate).
- 6. Communication (know your mate's mind). 3/28/87
 - 7. Don't get in a rut (when marriage gets routine and the mystery disappears).
 - A. Do not let your marital duties be a burden.
 - B. Keep your attitude towards your mate positive.
 - C. Share your day's experience with your mate.
 - D. Literally share your work (visiting, dishes, etc).
 - E. Be creative in finding ways to change your routine (from time to time, bring back the dating atmosphere).
 - 1. Special outings at least once a month.
 - 2. Saturday afternoon picnic.
 - 3. Little things mean a lot.

Jn 17:17,21-24 Christ wants us to join Him and the Father, in family unity, for all eternity. But after having oneness of mind.

Eph 3:14-15 The whole family is named after God.

You need to understand the physical family to understand the spiritual family (and visa-versa).

Amos 3:1-3 Two cannot walk together except they be agreed.

Matt 24:20-24 There was a lack of unity among the twelve: "I want to sit on your right hand".

vs 25-27 "minister" = $\langle diakonos \rangle$ = one who runs through the dust for others (your wife). Whoever is chief among you is your servant.

 $\frac{\text{Gal } 6:1-2}{\text{another's}}$ Help one who is overtaken in a fault. Bear one another's burdens and encourage.

Things which deter Family Unity.

- 1. Not putting God first in your life.
- 2. Selfishness.
- 3. Lack of communication.
- 4. Jealousy.
- 5. Poor planning.
- 6. Misuse of time.
- 7. The influence of outsiders (In-laws, etc).

Family Unity

How to Grow in Family Unity.

- 1. Put God first in your life.
- 2. Have outgoing concern.
- 3. Have good communication.
- 4. Work together (constructive labor).
- 5. Play together (recreation).
- 6. Eat together.
- 7. Exercise spiritual leadership and serve the brethren.
- 8. Establish clear priorities.
- 9. Be involved with the closer relatives (aunts, uncles, grandparents, cousins, etc).

Child Rearing

Child Rearing: The process of governing and educating from birth
to adulthood. (LRS)

Always keep in mind "the greatest truth we can ever know (MDS), the fact that God is reproducing Himself".

God is perfect, Holy, Righteous Character. He is creating this character in us.

In allowing us to have children, God is allowing us to play the role of both creator and ruler. (Our babies are created "in our own image").

The family unit is a type of God's spiritual government to come.

Line of Authority.

I Cor 11:3 Establishment of the chain of authority.
God -> Christ -> Husband -> Wife -> Children -> Dog.

Eph 5:21-23 The husband is the head of the wife.

Eph 6:1 Provoke not your children to wrath. The husband and wife are responsible for not misusing the authority God has given them.

Honor thy Father and Mother.

Ex 2:12 "Honor thy father and mother . . ." This fifth commandment is a bridge between love towards God (the first 4) and love towards neighbor (the last 5).

<u>Deut 6:7</u> Parents, diligently teach your children. It is our Christian responsibility to pass true spiritual principles on to our children.

Goals of child Rearing.

- 1. Obedience to God (train up a child in the way that he should go).
- 2. Prepare the child for abundant living (physically and spiritually).

Components of Child Rearing
Loving Authority

- 3. To experience the blessings and joys God intended families to have.
- 4. Through all of the above, to learn deeper spiritual lessons, and to better know God.

Components of Child Rearing.

- 1. Loving Authority.
 - A. Loving Authority involves God's love, coupled with delegated authority used to express that authority in the family.
 - B. I Cor 7:14 Parents are instruments of God, which he uses to work through to help the children.
 - C. Parents attitude must first be right with God in order to most effectively teach their children.
 - D. Motivation for any action toward the child must be with deep love for the child.

2. Instruction.

- A. Example -- a very powerful teacher and the best way to learn.
 - Children will learn what they live. It is easier for them to follow a bad example. You cannot expect a child to rise above the environment you create for them.
 - 2. Example is not enough -- they still must be taught.
 - 3. Setting the right example gives you credibility as a teacher.
 - 4. You must first teach unquestioned obedience before you teach the reason for obedience.
- B. Laws and rules laid down must accurately reflect your lifestyle and the goals you want to achieve. Otherwise, hypocrisy is present and the child becomes confused.

Components of Child Rearing
Instruction

- C. Every instruction or command, small or great, must be made perfectly clear, on the child's level of understanding. DO NOT ASSUME!
- D. Commands or requirements must be within the child's capacity to fulfill.
- E. Commands or requirements must never be contradictory to:
 - 1. God's laws,
 - 2. Other commands you expect obedience to.

***The final result of training you should desire is that your child knows there is a right way of life and chooses to live it. In other words -- your final goal is Character!

Teach children to make decisions based on God's laws

For how many years does a parent have immediate influence?

A child spends about 18-20 years at home. Out of the average age of 70, this means that a child will live at home for approx. 1/4 of his life.


Parents have total control over the helpless child at birth.

Child rearing is intended to take a child from total dependence to (near) total independence.

Problems in teen years and beyond will likely result from 1 of 2 mistakes, which are opposite extremes:

- 1. Retaining control too long,
- 2. Giving total independence too soon.

Components of Child Rearing
Discipline



The emphasis of the first several years must be on control. Emphasis on the later years must be on teaching. These two must go hand in hand.

The Spirit in Man is passed on through reproduction at the fertilization of the egg.

The first year of a child's life is the most important as far as learning goes.

You must be in control of the child during the early years to be able to teach it anything during and after puberty.

Puberty is the critical point.

It should always be a golden time of character building.

In today's world, the time of puberty is a source of frustration -- a giant mess.

Components of Child Rearing (con't).

3. <u>Discipline</u>: The sum total of the tools you use to motivate your child to follow your instructions and learn the meaning of them.

The goal is that ultimately the child will know that there is God's way of life and will choose it.

God set the example of discipline for us in using:blessing and cursing, reward and punishment, pleasure and pain.

Components of Child Rearing
Discipline

II Sam 7:14 God chastens his sons.

Heb 12:6 "For whom the Lord loves, he chastens . . ."

Prov 13:24 "He that spares the rod hates his son; but he that loves him chastens him.

Pro 23:13-14 "Withhold not correction from the child . . ."

Spanking is the most normal and generally best form of punishment.

Spanking is not the only way to punish.

Proper discipline includes both rewards and punishments.

Spanking is for disobedience, not to force into obedience.

Bribery is wrong, it is not rewarding or educating. Food should not be used as a reward or a punishment.

Typical sequence of discipline:

- 1. Parent gives child clear and possible instructions.
- 2. Child doesn't obey or "modifies" the obedience.
- 3. Parent tells what judgment is (I am spanking you for disobedience . .).
- 4. Spank (appropriately, no abuse).
- 5. Then the child should be loved and encouraged and shown that you are in complete harmony with him -- if the attitude is correct.
- Once the penalty is paid, it is paid and should not linger.



The child <u>must</u> be brought to submission. You must break the rebellion without breaking his spirit.

The child should never be spanked without a followup expression of love and affection.

Components of Child Rearing
Faith

There is time for mercy, but mercy can only be granted when the attitude is right.

The instructional process should begin at birth. Disciplining should begin as soon as the child is old enough to understand (usually by 6 weeks, if he needs it). The terrible 2's should never happen.

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Components of Child Rearing (con't).

4. Faith.

- A. Ask God to guide and bless your decisions -- to give you discernment.
- B. Pray for your children.
 - 1. I Cor 7:14 "... else where the children unclean; but now they are holy." The children are sanctified by the believing parents.
 - 2. God is able to soften, work with, and direct the child's mind.

The loss of childhood.

The best gift a mother can give her child is her presence.

The first thing a child should experience is love, affection, etc.

Help the child through discipline with love and affection.

Never contradict each other in front of the children.

Self esteem.

Self esteem cannot be given by the parents. The best you can do is put them on the right path.

Self esteem is constructed during early childhood. The building blocks are instances of small successes.

Engagment and Honeymoon

Engagement

Mr. Armstrong does not encourage long engagement periods.

Familiarity breeds contempt.

Drives are too strong to risk waiting too long.

Engagement: to publicly state your intention so that you may plan and take steps towards marriage to avoid other people thinking wrong of you.

To let everyone know what is going to happen.

Engagement should be long enough to make preparations, short enough to lessen undo pressures.

Honeymoon (MDS chpt 14).

80% of people today are non-virgins before the honeymoon.

Watch alcohol on wedding night (mood, car accidents, etc).

The world approaches sex as fun and pleasure and get married to "legalize" it.

Virginity should be (will be) brought up in the personal marriage counselling.

If you discover a sexual problem on the wedding night, seek counsel right away, not six months later.

First impressions are lasting ones. This night could affect the rest of your marriage. Might change bride's look at the sex act for the rest of her life.

Try to plan your wedding day around her menstrual cycle. Try to project it as far ahead as possible.

Do not embarrass the bride in any way. She may want to undress in private. She may want very low or no light. Do not "display" your body. This is not a night of sensual pleasure, but of outgoing love.

Making love is for sharing of love in the marriage, not for selfishly seeking pleasure.
