Rate of Toronto baptisms at record level

ORONTO, Ontario, Canada-In a society that is getting more and more secularized, the Toronto congregation of the Church of God International has been holding its own as it tries to help spread the good news of the return of Jesus Christ and His Kingdom

Bill Watson, pastor of CGI Toronto, baptized seven people between June 8 and July 27 this year, a record number for the church here since it was established in the 1980s. So far this year, there have been eight baptisms, again another record number for the year so far. In addition, two more baptisms will be done in the coming months.

Those baptized were Francisco Henriques, William Housden, Steve Agnew, Walter Watters, Rose Dias, Winston Bowers, Lucy Dubois, and Raymond Dubeau.

The Greater Toronto area has a population of over four million people. However, over the years, repeated studies have shown that church attendance across Canada has been steadily declining, but more recent studies in the past vear have shown that there has been a slight increase, especially since the September 11 terrorism bombing of the World Trade Center.

Toronto, like many other areas, is ripe for harvest, although it, too, is suffering moral decline. As a result, the Toronto congregation has stepped up its outreach program. A public Bible study was held in April of this year, and See TORONTO, page 2

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with pain, sorrow, greed, and vengeance. We are examples of what it means to remain faithful, even in times of hardship and sorrow.

Early on the Sabbath of June 22, we received news of the death of Sarah Corbitt. Sarah had fought a battle with Hodgkin's disease on and off, from the time she was 10 years old. She was a courageous young lady who, at age 17, had already endured more suffering than most of us will ever experience in our lifetime.

Sarah spent the last week of her life at Camp Sunshine, after having pleaded with her mom to let her go because she enjoyed it so much. Camp Sunshine is a place here in Georgia where children who are battling lifethreatening illnesses can go to experience the fun of camping and being treated like other kids.

Sarah died on the last day of camp, just before her parents, Holland and Constance Corbitt, arrived to take her home. Though they were devastated when informed of their daughter's death, there was some consolation in the knowledge that Sarah was where she wanted to be, doing what she loved the most. For her, that meant just being a teenager who went off to summer camp.

On Friday, June 28, Tommy Walker lost his sister to breast cancer. He traveled to New York to be with his family and had the opportunity to share God's truth with some of them. While it was a tragic time for the family, hopefully they received some comfort from the words of truth Tommy was able to share with them.

These three weeks were difficult ones for all of us.

Even if we did not know the ones who died, we could still relate and share in their grief. In spite of the circumstances, it was heartwarming to see the love displayed through the caring, serving people who stepped into action.

In a world filled with takers, it is a wonderful experience to see and be a part of a family of caregivers.

On the Sabbath following these tragic losses, Randy Ranstrom gave a sermon entitled "The Blessing of Death." In this sermon, he began by saying grief for a loved one can sometimes become selfish. We get so wrapped up in what we have lost that we lose sight of the fact that God doesn't view death in the same way mankind does. This isn't to say grieving is wrong, because grief is a normal, natural reaction to losing someone who has played an important role in our lives. However, comfort comes when we remember that our loved one no longer faces temptation or carries the burden of sin. Sin doesn't exist for the dead. Also, because we understand that fleshly bodies cannot enter into

God's kingdom, we acknowl-

edge that death must occur in all of us (1 Corinthians 15:50). Another passage of Scripture that brings comfort is found in Psalm 116:15, which reads, "Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of His saints."

Some highlights of the summer began with Pentecost. The Atlanta congregation traveled to Oxford, Alabama, and met for joint services with the folks from the Alabama congregations. Our roster of speakers included Steve Chappell, Randy Ranstrom, and Clint Mahoney, and we had approximately 80 people in attendance. After being fed on the spiritual food delivered by these speakers, the remainder of the afternoon was spent sampling the delectable dishes contributed for our potluck lunch, and enjoying a time of fellowship with our fellow brethren.

Another member of our congregation has seen evidence of God's answer to prayer. Ray Sprayberry's wife, Barbara, has been very ill and has been hospitalized for much of the summer. She made her entrance into the world at 1:33 a.m. and is the beautiful daughter of Athena and Curtis Mooney. Feast... or Vacation?

y third feast attendance, some years ago, was one for which I had great anticipation. That a number of Tabernacles (FOT) in Jamaica was the best piece of news I could have heard.

Why? After the first and second feasts at the internationally known Jamaican resort, Ocho Rios, I could hardly wait for the next one. It was great news to hear that our North American brethren would join our small group (about 25 then). It was something to look forward to without the shadow of a doubt.

However, I had an experience at that and subsequent feasts in Jamaica that I cannot erase from my mind. Then, coming to Canada to live in 1990, I soon discovered that, unfortunately, some of our brothers and sisters in the church seem to confuse vacations with the FOT.

Not for a moment is my aim to pick on our North American brethren. At the same time, I make no apologies for being blunt, because I believe this is an attitude that still affects the Church of God today. It's pathetic, and it should be a matter of concern for us all. We all should examine ourselves when we slip into this mode when we attend the FOT.

On the first day of that feast in Jamaica, most of our visiting brethren were present. To my utter dismay, by the second and third days, some brethren, including myself, were asking, "Where are the foreign brethren?" We did not see them again until the Last Great Day.

Most of us didn't get the drift as to their whereabouts. Of course, we did not want to pass any judgment. Nevertheless, by the following year, we learned firsthand. The brethren who disappeared told us of their adventures around the island. I clearly remember one brother renting a motorbike for an all-island tour.

In 1991, my family and I attended the FOT in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. If my memory serves me correctly, there were some 800 people on the first day. Afterward, the number trickled down. My experience at French Lick Springs in 1992 was hardly different.

Again, if I remember correctly, one year at Panama City Beach our numbers were well over 1000 for the first day. By the third day, attendance was somewhere in the 700 range.

In my conversations with brethren from time to time, I have often taken note of the manner in which the word *vacation* is substituted for references to the FOT. This should not be so. The FOT is the FOT; vacation is vacation. We take vacations for a period of rest and recreation from work. We attend the FOT in keeping with God's Word.

While some of us take our vacation period to attend the FOT, it DOESN'T mean we must use God's FOT as a vacation. It is not by any means a vacation.

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Why We Keep the Law

ome read a couple of scriptures, and then draw conclusions without considering what many other scriptures say about the same subject. Then, based on these faulty assumptions, they condemn others who practice things different from themselves. Let's look at a couple of scriptures that are commonly misunderstood and misapplied:

"For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:8–10).

"Therefore by the deeds of the law no flesh will be justified in His sight, for by the law is the knowledge of sin" (Romans 3:20).

Many read the first parts of these verses, but do not take note of what is written in the later parts. They simply think, "Well, since it is only by grace and faith, and since one cannot be justified by keeping the law, there is no reason to keep it."

Such people are suffering spiritual blindness because they do not consider the whole truth of God's Word. If they did, then they would see ample reasons for striving to keep every single one of God's laws as they apply to us.

Which Law?

Before going very far, we need to distinguish what law we are talking about. The second verse above shows that it is a law that defines sin. Another verse gives us more information about this particular law:

"Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for sin is the transgression of the law" (1 John 3:4, King James Version).

Notice that "sin" is defined as "the transgression of the law." To find out what law is in view here, consider the following scriptures:

"All unrighteousness is sin, and there is sin not leading to death" (1 John 5:17).

"Then it will be *righteousness* for us, if we are careful to observe all these *commandments* before the LORD our God, as He has commanded us" (Deuteronomy 6:25).

"My tongue shall speak of Your word, For *all Your* commandments are righteousness" (Psalm 119:172).

These passages are speaking of the Ten Commandments, which define both sin and righteousness. Sin is unrighteousness, or law-breaking. Righteousness is just the opposite; it is equated with keeping the commandments.

Four Reasons for Keeping the Commandments

The first reason to keep them is because God's Word tells us to do so. God tells us that He is holy, and He wants us to be holy as well.

"[B]ut as He who called you is *holy*, you also *be holy* in all your conduct, because it is written, 'Be holy, for I am holy'" (1 Peter 1:15–16).

"Beloved, do not imitate what is evil, but what is good. He who does good is of God, but he who does evil has not seen God" (3 John 1:11).

"[D]o not become sluggish, but imitate those who through faith and patience inherit the promises" (Hebrews 6:12).

There simply is no excuse for anyone who reads God's Word to reason around the essential truth that we must strive to obey God's commandments to the best of our ability, and with God's help.

Now, let us go a little further in our understanding. If simply keeping God's law will not justify or save us, why does God want us to keep it?

God gave us His law because it teaches about conduct that will destroy our lives and bring about death.

"The soul who sins shall die. The son shall not bear the guilt of the father, nor the father bear the guilt of the son. The righteousness of the righteous shall be upon himself, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon himself" (Ezekiel 18:20). "For *the wages of sin is death*, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

Not only will unrepented and unforgiven sin bring physical and eternal death; it brings terrible consequences in this life as well.

The second reason to keep God's laws is so we will not be enslaved to evil, which ultimately will totally corrupt us and separate us from God.

"Do you not know that to whom you present yourselves slaves to obey, you are that one's slaves whom you obey, whether of *sin leading to death*, or of obedience leading to righteousness?" (Romans 6.16).

If we follow the ways of sin, or transgressing God laws, we become obedient to Satan. Eventually, we will not even desire God's forgiveness and mercy, for we would become totally corrupted and twisted like Satan.

"For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit, the things of the Spirit. For to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. *Because the carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God*, nor indeed can be. So then, those who are in the flesh cannot please God" (Romans 8:5–8).

"[The servant of God should correct] those who are in opposition, if God perhaps will grant them repentance, so that they may know the truth, and that they may come to their senses and *escape the snare of the devil, having been taken captive by him to do his will*" (2 Timothy 2:25–26).

The third reason to keep God's laws is that we are commanded to become like Jesus Christ. This is simply impossible if we do not try our best to keep God's laws. "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ

Jesus" (Philippians 2:5).

"[God wishes to bring us all] to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a perfect man, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:13).

"For to this you were called, because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that *you should follow His steps:* 'Who committed no sin, Nor was deceit found in His mouth'" (1 Peter 2:21–22).

"If you keep My commandments, you will abide in My love, just as I have kept My Father's commandments and abide in His love" (John 15:10).

For us to become like Jesus Christ we must learn to keep God's laws in spirit and letter as He gave us example. Sure, we will not be perfect as long as we are human beings; but, if our spirit has been united with His, we will want to be perfect, and will humbly and contritely ask for forgiveness when we fall short.

"My little children, these things I write to you, so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the rightcous. And He Himself is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the whole world. Now by this we know that we know Him, if we keep His commandments. He who says, 'I know Him,' and does not keep His commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him. But whoever keeps His word, truly the love of God is perfected in him. By this we know that we are in Him. He who says he abides in Him ought himself also to walk just as He walked" (1 John 2:1–6).

The fourth reason for keeping all of God's laws is that if we break one we will be lead to breaking others, and the curses from breaking them will continually build until they totally destroy our lives and bring death.

"For whoever shall keep the whole law, and yet stumble in one point, he is guilty of all" (James 2:10).

This scripture tells us that we must be vigilant in keeping God's laws, for breaking even one makes one a lawbreaker and leads to breaking others. It is like a child who takes things that do not belong to him. If this behavior is not stopped early, when he grows older he will probably commit petty theft, and eventually he may commit grand larceny.

So we should understand that the keeping of God's

laws is not optional for the true Christian.

An Important Key for Law-Keepers

Now here is a key concerning keeping the laws of God: We should keep them as Jesus did. Christ's example and teachings show us how to properly understand and obey God's Ten Commandments. Many people try to tell others just what laws should be kept and how one should keep them. But we must look to the Scriptures and study the example and teachings of Jesus, and let God's Spirit lead us to a deeper understanding of God's will.

We are individually responsible to insure that what we learn and practice truly comes from God. We cannot pass this responsibility on to others and simply follow them without question. We must learn God's Word and use it to verify what we are told by others. Read and reread the following scriptures:

John 17:17: "Sanctify them by Your *truth*. Your *word* is *truth*."

John 14:6: "Jesus said to him, 'I am the *way*, the *truth*, and the *life*. No one comes to the Father except through Me.""

John 1:14: "And the *Word* became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and *truth*."

John 4:23–24: "But the hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in *spirit* and *truth*; for the Father is seeking such to worship Him. 'God is *Spirit*, and those who worship Him must worship in *spirit* and *truth*.'"

John 16:13: "However, when He, the *Spirit* of *truth*, has come, He will guide you into all *truth*; for He will not speak on His own authority, but whatever He hears He will speak; and He will tell you things to come."

2 Timothy 2:15: "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the *word of truth.*" 1 John 2:27: "But the anointing which you have

1 John 2:27: "But the anointing which you have received from Him abides in you, and you do not need that anyone *teach you*; but as the same anointing teaches you concerning all things, and is true, and is not a lie, and just as it has taught you, you will abide in Him."

1 Corinthians 11:1: "Imitate me, just as I also imitate Christ."

The Ten Commandments

Let us briefly run through the Ten Commandments. I will be brief to illustrate how much we need to study each one so we can remove many subtle errors that may be causing us a lot of grief in which we do not understand the cause.

Basically, the first four tell us how to properly worship God and show Him honor and respect. The last six deal with our relationship with others here on earth. Every act that we do relates directly or indirectly with these commandments. Remember, they were given for our benefit. Violating them will bring curses upon others and us. This is automatic, and unless God intervenes they will come as surely as we breathe. Even if we repent and ask for forgiveness, and even if God forgives us, we still may suffer the consequences physically for breaking them.

So, it is not just a simple, "Sorry, God, for breaking that law. Forgive me," and now everything is just fine. WRONG! In most cases there will be problems even if we do not have to bear them spiritually and face the death sentence that extinguishes our life for all eternity. That is why we must strive to constantly obey God, keeping every single one of His commandments just like Jesus did.

Let's turn to the listing of God's Ten Commandments and spend just a few minutes hitting some highlights to jog our memory to their importance in our lives. First, notice Exodus 20:

"And God spoke all these words, saying: 'I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage" (verses 1–2).

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Before going on, let us drop down to verses 18 through 20:

"Now all the people witnessed the thunderings, the lightning flashes, the sound of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking; and when the people saw it, they trembled and stood afar off. Then they said to Moses, 'You speak with us, and we will hear; but let not God speak with us, lest we die.' And Moses said to the people, 'Do not fear; for God has come to test you, and that His fear may be before you, so that you may not sin.'"

This is God directly telling His people what sin is. No need for man to make up a list: No dancing, card playing, movie going, drinking, etc. Unless one can tie the misuse of some activity to one of these ten laws it simply is not sin I don't care what some religious traditions have taught in the past.

Worship reserved for God alone

Now, let's go back and take up where we left off. In Exodus 20:3, God says, "You shall have no other gods before Me." This is the First Commandment of the Decalogue.

To put anything ahead of God is to break this commandment. God, and God alone, is to be worshipped. We may love, honor, and deeply respect our brothers and sisters, but our worship belongs to God the Father and Jesus Christ.

Unfortunately, there are some selfstyled religious experts debating whether Jesus Christ was a created being or truly God, and, consequently, whether He is worthy of our worship. How foolish can one become? Read the Word; study it; meditate on it. Using it with God's Spirit, we can know the truth and be set free of the ignorance that enslaves man to false ideas and reasoning.

Notice what John's Gospel says about the preincarnate Word:

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that was made...He was in the world, and the world was made through Him, and the world did not know Him...And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:1–3,10,14).

Clearly, the One who became Jesus Christ was *with* God the Father, and *was* Himself God. He could not have been a created being, for the passage above plainly states that He participated in the making of *all* created things.

Remember, what appears to be "intellectual" and "scholarly" may be completely foolish in God's eyes. Paul spoke of those who claimed "to be wise," but "became fools" (Romans 1:22). He cautioned the Corinthians about the deception of false wisdom:

"Let no one deceive himself. If anyone among you seems to be wise in this age, let him become a fool that he may become wise. For *the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God*. For it is written, 'He catches the wise in their own craftiness'; and again, 'The LORD knows the thoughts of the wise, that they are futile'" (1 Corinthians 3:18–20).

God to be worshipped in spirit and truth

The Second Commandment reads, "You

shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; you shall not bow down to them nor serve them. For I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and fourth generations of those who hate Me, but showing mercy to thousands, to those who love Me and keep My commandments" (Exodus 20:4–6).

Every religion of man has some kind of image that it identifies itself with However, in the true religion of God, we are instructed not to have any kind of image integral to our religious worship of Him. That means crosses, pictures of Christ, statutes of Mary, and so on, violate this commandment. People try to split hairs and say they do not worship these things but God simply says, "Do not use any kind of representation of anything as a device to facilitate your worship of Me." God wants to be in our inward parts, our very mind and spirit, not in some kind of physical object we can see.

God's name to be hallowed

Now we come to the Third Commandment: "You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain, for the LORD will not hold him guiltless who takes His name in vain" (Exodus 20:7).

Have we ever used God or His name in some kind of joke? Have we ever used the name "God" or "Jesus" in expressing frustration or anger? The very name of God should be so sacred that we never use it unless we are addressing Him in prayer or speaking of Him reverently.

The Sabbath to be kept

The Fourth Commandment states, "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the LORD your God. In it you shall do no work: you, nor your son, nor your daughter, nor your male servant, nor your stranger who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it" (Exodus 20:8–11).

Even in this scripture God reveals which day He has set aside for rest and worship for true believers. Trust God's Word; do not lean on the "wisdom" of men who think they can decide how to obey God. Read Leviticus 23, for it is God's Word, and it reveals a lot more about God's Sabbaths—days that He has made special to reveal His mind and His plan to those who will obey Him and find truth rather than error.

Parents to be honored

The Fifth Commandment is the first that concerns how we relate to one another, but it also teaches us something about our relationship with our Heavenly Father. It reads, "Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long upon the land which the LORD your God is giving you" (Exodus 20:12).

The family unit is integral to God's way of life. God is a family, and He is making sons out of human beings. He tests them, puts His Spirit in them, and will one day resurrect or transform them to a new body just like His own. Learn about things that strengthen family ties and bonds. Practice them with all your might. These things are the making of eternal life.

Life to be cherished

The Sixth Commandment reads, "You shall not murder" (Exodus 20:13).

Let us fully understand this commandment. It goes to the intent of our hearts and minds and involves our feeling toward others. Hate and bitterness have no part in one called by God to become like His Son. Even while Jesus was dying He forgave those who betrayed Him and put Him to death.

Marital commitments to be kept

The Seventh Commandment forbids marital infidelity: "You shall not commit adultery" (Exodus 20:14).

Satan uses adultery to destroy man's faith and the family unit. It takes a strong commitment to marry and stay married in our society. It's easy to find justification for divorce, and infidelity is often considered a minor flaw rather than a major sin.

Someone described marriage as a besieged fortress: Everyone on the inside is trying to get out and everyone on the outside is trying to get in.

Making and keeping commitments is absolutely essential to developing the kind of faith that we must have to please God.

"But without *faith* it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6).

Having and keeping our commitments to family, friends, and relationships with others builds our ability to keep our commitment to God. Anything that breaks this down in our lives with others breaks down our commitment to God.

Others' property to be respected

The Eighth Commandment concerns respecting others' belongings: "You shall not steal" (Exodus 20:15).

Never take anything you do not earn or cannot rightly have. Don't trust in winning the lottery to save you from your debts. Be thankful and content for whatever you have, and plan and execute the plan to prosper with the intent that it will help you to help others and not just yourself.

Truth to be esteemed

The Ninth Commandment states, "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor" (Exodus 20:16).

One of the base elements of Satan is that of being a liar. He is the originator of this practice of using information to deceive or create problems with others. Many friends are separated because of untruth and rumors. If you hear something bad, simply refuse to tell it to someone else. If you must tell someone, be absolutely sure of its authenticity, and determine why and what might happen if you share it.

"A perverse man sows strife, And a whisperer separates the best of friends" (Proverbs 16:28).

"He who covers a transgression seeks love, But he who repeats a matter separates friends" (Proverbs 17:9).

"These six things the LORD hates, Yes, seven are an abomination to Him: A proud look, A lying tongue, Hands that shed innocent blood, A heart that devises wicked plans, Feet that are swift in running to evil, A false witness who speaks lies, And one who sows discord among brethren' (Proverbs 6:16–19).

Notice that sowing discord—even if what is told is true—among brethren is committing an abominable act before God.

Desires to be managed

All the sins described above originate with unlawful or excessive desire. The Tenth Commandment goes to the heart of the problem:

"You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, nor his male servant, nor his female servant, nor his ox, nor his donkey, nor anything that is your neighbor's" (Exodus 20:17).

It is interesting that God put this commandment, which deals with the "starting point" of sinful behavior, at the very end of the list. Our wrong behavior begins in our hearts and minds. When we dwell on things that we cannot rightly gain, we lose appreciation for all the things we have. A contented heart is a powerful asset in our faithful relationship with Almighty God.

"Now godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. And having food and clothing, with these we shall be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and harmful lusts which drown men in destruction and perdition. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, for which some have strayed from the faith in their greediness, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows. But you, O man of God flee these things and pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, gentleness. Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, to which you were also called and have confessed the good confession in the presence of many witnesses" (1 Timothy 6:6-12).

Choose Life!

Why do we keep the law? Only a fool would want to do otherwise. Blessings are a lot more enjoyable than curses. In keeping the commandments we are choosing the way of life rather than of death.

"See, I have set before you today life and good, death and evil, in that I command you today to love the LORD your God, to walk in His ways, and to keep His commandments His statutes and His judgments, that you may live and multiply; and the LORD your God will bless you in the land which you go to possess. But if your heart turns away so that you do not hear, and are drawn away, and worship other gods and serve them, I announce to you today that you shall surely perish; you shall not prolong your days in the land which you cross over the Jordan to go in and possess. I call heaven and earth as witnesses today against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing; therefore choose life, that both you and your descendants may live" (Deuteronomy 30:15).

Are We 'Sons of God' Now?

We are not yet "spirit" sons of God. We belong to Him because He made the first "pair," but we must be in the Book of Life to see Him as He is. Where in the Bible are people called sons of God?

Since God made Adam and Eve, He is the Father of all mankind. In that sense, we are all the "children of God." But true Christians are sons (or children) of God in a special sense. We are not yet spirit beings; but, through the regenerative and vivifying power of the Holy Spirit acting on our human spirit, we *are* sons (children) of God, nevertheless. The apostle Paul writes, "For as many as are led by

the Spirit of God, these are the *sons of God*. For you did not receive the spirit of bondage again to fear, but you received the Spirit of adoption [literally, *sonship*] by whom we cry out, 'Abba, Father.' The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are the children of God, and if children, then heirs—heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if indeed we suffer with Him, that we may also be glorified together'' (Romans 8:14–17).

Notice that the Spirit of God—the Holy Spirit, the means through which God the Father and Jesus Christ His Son make their abode with us (see John 14–16)—*bears witness* that we are the children of God. This is *not* the language of metaphor! It means quite plainly that if the Spirit of God dwells within us, then we are *literally* the children of God. We are *literally* "heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ."

In other words, God's people—those in whom the Spirit of God dwells—are members of God's own *family*.

When the New Testament says that God is our Father, it does not mean that He is our Father in the figurative sense—the sense in which an inventor is the "father" of his invention—but in the sense of a literal *begettal*. This happens when His Holy Spirit joins with our human spirit and imparts divine life to us.

The apostle Paul says that "he who is united to the Lord *becomes one spirit with Him*" (1 Corinthians 6:17), adding that "your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God" (verse 19). The human spirit, now joined with God's Spirit, makes the believer a "new creation" in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17; Galatians 6:15).

John writes, "Behold what manner of love the Father has bestowed on us, that we should be called children of God!" (1 John 3:1).

Think of it! Almighty God Himself gives us the privilege of addressing Him as our *Father*. And we—if the Holy Spirit resides within us—have the honor of being His begotten children.

John continues, "Beloved, now we are children of God; and it has not yet been revealed what we shall be"—God is our Father and we are His children, but we have yet to experience the fullness of that relationship—"but we know that when He is revealed"—when Christ comes down from heaven and is seen by all—"we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is" (verse 2). Only when we join Him in His Kingdom-Family will we comprehend Him fully, and we can comprehend Him fully only when we are made to be like Him.

A few verses later, John says, "Whoever has been born [begotten] of God does not [practice] sin, for His [God's] seed remains in him; and he cannot sin [habitually, as a way of life], because he has been born [begotten] of God" (verse 9).

The word translated "seed" elsewhere refers to sperm. The Spirit of God—the agency through which divine life is imparted to the believer—is here compared to the male sperm, which fertilizes the female ovum and imparts the characteristics of the father to the newly begotten human life. When God gives His Spirit to a repentant believer, an "impregnation" occurs. The Spirit imparts to the believer the characteristics of the Father. As long as the believer abides in the Spirit, the process of spiritual growth continues, and he becomes more and more like Jesus Christ, the Father's firstborn Son. And finally, when the time for "delivery" has come, the child of God emerges from the "womb" fully developed and bearing the likeness of his elder Brother. At that moment, he literally, and in the fullest sense, becomes a member of the immortal *lamily of God*!

How Do You Identify a 'Laodicean'?

I believe it would be interesting to do a study of the Laodicean church to compliment your "Seven Golden Lampstands" study. This study I am suggesting could/should address the question, How would believers identify the Laodicean church? There is a WCG splinter group pointing the finger at all

other groups and labeling them "Laodicean." I have always thought of Laodiceans as being an attitude prevalent in the end-time church as reflected in the thought, "I am rich and increased in goods and have need of nothing." I believe this is self-sufficiency.

Without a doubt, the "Laodicean attitude" is "alive and well" in the Church of God today, but it also existed in the early church. Proof of this is in the book of Revelation itself. Even the most radical of the "Philadelphian fundamentalists" accept the fact that the seven churches named and described in Revelation 2 and 3 literally existed when the apostle John received the visions that would make up this book. One major difference between them and me is that they accept as a matter of *doctrine* the view that these seven literal churches represent seven successive eras spanning the entire church age, from Pentecost to the Parousia. I firmly believe that it is a mistake to put this view in the category of "doctrine" or "dogma." At best, it is a *theory;* and, in my opinion, it lacks any real biblical or historical support.

You suggested doing a study addressing the question, "How would believers identify the Laodicean church?" I would prefer to revise the question somewhat. Perhaps something like this would be more in line with my preferences: "What are the characteristics of a 'Laodicean'?" I prefer this question because *all* the characteristics described in Revelation 2 and 3 can probably be found in every church. In other words, each congregation probably has a few "Philadelphians" as well as a handful of "Laodiceans." I wouldn't want to label a whole congregation one way or the other.

I agree with your assessment: at least one of the problems with the church in Laodicea was its self-sufficiency. They boasted, "I am rich, have become wealthy, and have need of nothing," but Christ said that they didn't know they were "wretched, miserable, poor, blind, and naked" (Revelation 3:17).

The city of Laodicea was known for its wealth, its garment industry, and a medical community that produced a salve for certain conditions of the eye. Christ alludes to the city's wealth and resources when He describes the spiritual condition of the church, and when He admonishes her members to zealously repent: "I counsel you to buy from Me gold refined in the fire, that you may be rich; and white garments, that you may be clothed, that the shame of your nakedness may not be revealed; and anoint your eyes with eye salve, that you may see" (verse 18).

Self-sufficiency of the sort that afflicted the church of Laodicea is rooted in *pride*. As long as the prideful spirit is allowed full expression, there can be no honest self-evaluation, no facing up to the truth about one's own motives. Pride, if given full reign, leads a person to redefine himself completely. Serious sins become minor weaknesses. Minor accomplishments become grand achievements. Vices become virtues. Revisions like these are possible only when a person blinds himself to his own motives. Such is the fruit of pride.

Many erroneously assume that the problem with the church in Laodicea was nothing more than spiritual apathy. This is based on Christ's condemning depiction of this church: "I know your works, that you are neither cold nor hot. I could wish you were cold or hot. So then, because you are lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will vomit you out of My mouth" (verses 15–16).

The Laodiceans' spiritual condition is compared with lukewarm water, which is not good for quenching thirst (as cold water is) or for soothing painful conditions (as hot water is). The terms "hot" and "cold" do not refer to spiritual fervor ("hot") and apathy ("cold"), for then we would have Christ saying that He would rather see His people apathetic than mildly enthusiastic. "Lukewarm," then, does not refer to a spiritual condition midway between indifference and passionate; it refers to a deplorable condition wherein prideful arrogance is mistaken for righteousness.

While apathy most likely existed in Laodicea, the condition Christ condemns was far worse than a mere lack of spiritual zeal. The Laodiceans' sin was the antithesis of the humility and spirit of obedience God wants to see in His people.

It's not too difficult to spot a Laodicean—except when the Laodicean is oneself. Unfortunately, when a Laodicean glimpses his own arrogance, he is usually able to quickly redefine what he sees. "That's not pride," he says; "it's *passion*—passion for the work of God! I guess that makes me a Philadelphian."

What About Calling Up the Dead?

Most Christians are against communicating with the dead. In view of that, what is your answer to Moses and Elijah appearing?

God plainly condemns necromancy, or conjuration of the spirits of the dead, along with all other forms of occultism. Notice His warning to Israel: "There shall not be found among you anyone who makes his son or his daughter pass through the fire, or one who practices witchcraft, or a soothsaver, or one who interprets

omens, or a sorcerer, or one who conjures spells, or a medium, or a spiritist, or one who calls up the dead. For all who do these things are an *abomination* to the LORD, and because of these abominations the LORD your God drives them out from before you" (Deuteronomy 18:10–12).

In view of God's powerful condemnation of necromancy and other such practices, we should immediately rule out the idea that the Transfiguration narrative suggests divine approval for these practices.

The Transfiguration is reported in Matthew 17 and Luke 9. Both accounts tell us that Moses and Elijah appeared and spoke with Jesus when He "transfigured" before the disciples. Later, after Moses and Elijah disappeared and Jesus' appearance returned to normal, "Jesus commanded them [His disciples], saying, 'Tell the *vision* to no one until the Son of Man is risen from the dead" (Matthew 17:9).

This was a *vision*. Therefore, one cannot use this narrative to prove that Moses and Elijah were actually there, or that their spirits consciously dwell in some ethereal realm, and are capable of "crossing over" to our world.

Even if the real Moses and Elijah had been temporarily raised from the dead and made to appear alongside Jesus, this is certainly no evidence that God overturned His law concerning spiritism and the occult. There is no suggestion in the text that it is now all right to conjure up the dead.

any of us enjoy science fiction. Many years ago, H.G. Wells wrote a novel called *The Time Machine*. There have been several movie adaptations of it. There was a series of hit movies called *Back to the Future*. There was a series on TV called *Quantum Leap* that was quite popular. Wouldn't it be wonderful, sometime, to have your own time machine and go back into the past and change things?

What if you had a time machine? What if you could have gone back less than a year ago—back to the infamous 9-11 knowing what you know today? What would you have done? Called the police? The President? Called in a "bomb scare" to get all those people out of there? *Could* you have changed things? And what would have happened as a result if you *had*?

We have all had regrets, made mistakes, and missed opportunities.

Would there be anything you would change to prevent you from becoming like the person you now see before you?

Unfortunately, we do not have a time machine, but we do have something nearly as good. We have **today**. And, God willing, **tomorrow**. We can make changes in our lives **now**. Today. While there is yet time

Our Time Machine

God's Word—the Bible—is, in a sense, a "time machine." It is first and foremost a history book. Through its pages we can peer into the remote past. We can see into other dimensions—into the spirit world. We can see into the hearts and minds of men. We can see the wisdom of the ages. And we can also see into the future. Prophecy is but history written in advance. Through this time machine, we can know the very plan of God, and adjust our lives accordingly.

Is there anything in your life that, say, 20 years from now, you will wish you *had* changed? Comedian George Burns once said, "If I had known I was going to live

this long, I would have taken better care of myself!" Physically, is there anything that you should be doing differently? Are we eating as we should? Exercising? Is there some bad habit we should break, or a good habit we should inculcate? Spiritually, is there anything we should be doing, or not doing? Is there a habitual sin we should overcome? Is there someone we should help? Someone we need to forgive? Someone we should love?

What about the Big Three: prayer, Bible study, and meditation? Are we doing OK? Or is there something we should change?

If so, let's change it. We can, you know. We're not alone. We have each other for help and support. We have God's Spirit to guide us. And we have God Himself to open and close doors of opportunity for us.

Many professed Christians are always doubting and fearing, and they are sometimes convinced that this is the necessary state of believers. This is a mistake, for "all things are possible to him that believeth" (Mark 9:23), and it is possible for us to enter into such a state of closeness with God that any doubt or fear can be as a shadow, flitting across the soul but never lingering there.

When you read of the daring exploits of God's people in the pages of your Bible,

when you read the trusting psalms of David, do you sometimes sigh and murmur in the chamber of your heart: "Alas! These are not for me"? When you hear of deeds which men have done in the name of Jesus; what they have enjoyed of Him; how much they have been like Him; how they have been able to endure great persecutions for His sake; do you say, "Ah! As for me, I am nothing; I can never attain to this"?

God is no respecter of persons (Acts 10:34). There is nothing which one saint became or overcame that you cannot become or overcame. There is no stature of grace, no attainment of spirituality, no clearness of assurance, no call of duty which is not open to you if you have but the power to believe, to trust, and to obey (Matthew 21:22; Psalm 56:4,11; Acts 5:29).

CGI Sabbath school coordinator featured in local paper

ditor's Note: Church member Noni McVey of California was featured in a local newspaper article for her charitable volunteer work. The article, originally published under the title "Project Linus comforts kids in crisis" in the March 12 edition of The Monterey County Herald, is reprinted below in its entirety.

Danny is 3. Delaney, his baby sister and best friend in the world, was just 15 months. But earlier this month, in a terrible twist of surgery gone wrong, Delaney died. Danny has had only 36 months of life to learn how to cope with this kind of grief.

Carmel's Noni McVey has never met Danny nor Delaney or any of his family members, except for her friend and his great-aunt, Jeanne Hale. But she did have an idea how to help Danny. Upon hearing the news of the tragedy, McVey went out for supplies and returned home to make Danny a blanket. Within a few days, it was his.

"When his mother gave Danny the blanket Noni had made," said hale, "she told him, 'Any time you're thinking about Delaney and feeling sad, and you want to have her around you, just hang on to this blanket.' Danny has kept this blanket with him and has slept with it around him; it has been his connection to his little sister. My family has been amazed how this blanket could mean so much to this little by. It's given him something to hang onto."

Noni McVey knew it would. She also knew it wouldn't bring back his sister, but that it might give him a warm hug when he needs it.

"At a time when a child feels nothing but clouds in his life," she said, "he can feel the warmth of a blanket wrap him with a sense of security. It's not that the medical field doesn't provide a lot, but it can't offer a pill that tells a child he's loved, cared for, safe and secure. We can give him that through this gesture."

This gesture provided one more hug among more than 400,000 blankets that have been delivered worldwide through Project Linus, a volunteer-based, nonprofit organization founded by Karen Loucks in 1996 to "provide security through blankets" to ill or traumatized children.

Loucks had just learned how to crochet when, on Christmas Eve 1995, she saw "Joy to the World," an article in Parade Magazine by Pulitzer Prize-winning photojournalist Eddie Adams. The story featured the picture of a tiny child with cancer, who said that her security blanket was helping her get through her chemotherapy treatments.

Inspired, Loucks responded by providing blankets to Denver's Rocky Mountain Children's Cancer Center, her first gesture toward the establishment of Project Linus. Named for the Peanuts cartoon character

whose profundity and wisdom seemed anchored in the security of his blanket, and endorsed by the late Charles Shulz, Project Linus now operates out of more than 300 chapters worldwide.

Thanks to Noni McVey, one of the newest chapters functions in Monterey County.

"Extending the hand of warmth and love to a child," said McVey, "creates a wonderful circle of care, as it provides healing and comfort not just to the child who receives the blanket, but to the parents and other family members who witness the gift. It's a basic concept of showing a love for the children of our community. I can't think of anything nicer."

McVey is no stranger to caring for children. A native of Phoenix who moved to the Monterey Peninsula during her teens, she went to Southern California to study business and theology at Ambassador College, but returned to Carmel to marry and raise a family.

A full-time wife and mother who puts her family first, McVey has made a dedicated career out of her volunteer work, particularly on behalf of her daughters, Elizabeth and Jordana.

"My children are the center of my life," she said. "I volunteered all through their schooling, and Jordana and I enjoyed making quilts for the National Charity League. When she graduated from high school, we could no longer participate in the League, but we just couldn't stop making blankets. So, I knit one for Project Linus, instead." And then 9-11 happened.

"As did everyone in America, we wanted to do something," said McVey. "We learned they needed blankets for the victims, so we made more."

Project Linus sent 10,000 handmade blankets to victims of the World Trade Center. It sent 600 more to the victims of the Pentagon. Another 5,000 blankets were shipped to Afghanistan.

But McVey wasn't finished. In fact, she was on a mission. Calling her project "Sew for America's Children," she went to every local fabric and crafts store she could find in the phone book and asked for donations. The response was generous. Among local donors is Picante Sportswear in Pacific Grove, which contributed three oversized boxes of hand-woven fabric.

swatches. It was so beautiful; it encouraged us all the more to let them pick out whatever they could use. It's just a wonderful project."

MeVey also sent out fliers, inviting friends and neighbors to make blankets for Project Linus. She collected 14 blankets, but learned from headquarters that many others had sent theirs in directly. It was then that Project Linus invited McVey to become a coordinator and establish "Project Linus Monterey Bay." She didn't hesitate.

"Since October," she said, "I've collected and distributed about 80 blankets. They tend to go out the door as fast as we get them in. I have 10 volunteers right now, but we need more. I want people to know that we need blankets for children here, in this community. We are working with the Department of Social Services and the Women's Crisis Center. The fire departments carry blankets on fire engines. We want to know which agencies and hospitals would like blankets. We've found if people know where the need is, they'll fill it."

Blankets, given to boys and girls—from newborn to 19 years old—must be handmade, washable and new. They may be any size and style, including but not limited to knit, crocheted, fleece, quilted, appliqued and woven blankets. Upon receipt, McVey stitches a "Made With Tender Loving Care for Project Linus" label into every blanket.

She is hoping to have a lot more labels to sew on next Sunday, which has been designated as "Blanket Day" on the Monterey Peninsula. Courtesy of the DoubleTree Hotel, Project Linus Monterey Bay is hosting a "sewing circle" for anyone who would like to donate time or materials toward what she hopes will be many blankets.

"Even if you can't sew," she said, "we can still use your help. If you'd like to learn, we'll show you. The simplest lesson is to make the blanket as if you're making it for a child you love, knowing that every stitch counts. It's easy to go buy a blanket for a child, but it's quite a gift to put yourself into it."

For those who have blankets ready to donate, you can drop them off at any of the following locations: Beverly Fabrics in Seaside, Girl Scouts Monterey Bay Council in Castroville, The Hand Maden in Pacific Grove, Elizabeth Ashley & Boyz Only at The Barnyard in Carmel and, on Blanket Day, at The DoubleTree Hotel in Monterev.

Blessings on meeting overshadow weather and health

He expressed his belief that we will never recover the quality of life that we had in the United States prior to the tragedy of September 11, 2001. Several people were still there visiting and discussing the lecture an hour and a half after it ended.

Nearly half of the audience was made up of CGI members. There were members of two different independent groups there as well. How to Be Used of God

Many ask, "What can I do? How can I be used of God?" We're glad you asked! Here is the answer!

any times after hearing an inspiring sermon, or after returning from the Feast of Tabernacles, or even after baptism, we ponder, "Okay. I agree. But what can *I* do? How can I be *used* of God?" The first thing we must do is to take a selfinventory and ask, "What do I *have* to *be* used? Look into your mirror. What do you see? Well, you have a mind, eyes, and ears. You've got a voice, hands, and feet. And you've got heart. And that is enough! Let's look deeper into this composite picture of yourself and see what God can use.

Second Timothy 2:21 tells us, "If a man therefore purge [cleanses, or purifies] himself...he shall be a vessel unto honor, sanctified, and meet [useful, or fit] for the master's use, and prepared unto every good work."

If you want to be used of God... Let Him think through your mind

How do we let God think through our minds? Hebrews 10:16 explains: "This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, saith the Lord, I will put my laws into their hearts, and *in their minds* will I write them." In other words, we must begin to think as God thinks in every aspect of our lives, just as though He inscribed His laws indelibly into our minds.

Second Timothy 1:7 tells us, "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." A sound mind is a gift of God, and the more we begin to think as God thinks, the sounder our minds become.

Sin begins in the mind. A man has to *think* wrong before he *acts* wrong. This is why Christ made the Commandments even *more* binding, covering not only the *letter* of the law, *but the very thoughts and intents of the heart* as well. For example, Christ said in Matthew 5:21–22, "Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not kill; and whosoever shall kill shall be in danger of the judgment. But *I* say unto you, that whosoever is angry with his brother without a cause shall be in danger of the judgment."

Instead of "doing away" with God's law, as some pretend, Christ made it sinful to even hate in the mind because He knew that action follows thought. Further, He said in Matthew 5:27-28, "Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not commit adultery. But I say unto you, that whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart." Christ did not "do away" with any laws; instead, He magnified them (Isaiah 42:21)-expanded them to their spiritual intent. As Paul put it, "Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ" (2 Corinthians 10:5). To put it another way, we need to condition our minds to think as God thinks. Succinctly, we need to examine God's Word and spiritually discern its spiritual intent, not look for loopholes to get around something that may interfere with our libidinous lifestyle.

Be assured that God can put thoughts and ideas into your mind that can be used to bless others and glorify Himself. However, God will not force you to obey Him. God awaits your cooperation. You must discipline your thinking; fill you mind with *Bible* thoughts. Paul advises, "Let this *mind* be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 2:5) "For who hath known the *mind* of the Lord, that he may instruct him? But we have the *mind* of Christ" (1 Cointhians 2:16). Therefore, if you want to be used of God, allow His thoughts to become your thoughts.

If you want to be used of God ...

Let Him see through your eyes

Revelation 3:18 says to "anoint thine eyes with eye-

salve, that thou mayest see," spiritually speaking, of course. God's Word, the Bible, is that eyesalve! Apply it liberally.

Satan the devil, on the other hand, attempts to deceive and blind us by distracting and diverting our attention through—what?—"the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life" (1 John 2:16). Satan is an artful and malignant spirit, and has many devices for deception and injuring the cause of Christ, ruining the lives of men. Persons who disbelieve his existence, who do not oppose his influence, or are ignorant of his devices will soon be overtaken by his subtlety. He can be likened to a master magician, distracting you in one area while he accomplishes his evil deeds in another. But we are not ignorant of his devices (2 Corinthians 2:11). We must be on the constant *look*out for his sorcery.

The Lord wants to see through your eyes—how you perceive the world. And He wants you to see through His eyes—from His perspective. He wants you to see the blessings that come from obeying His laws—and the curses that ensue from disobedience. He also wants us to see the hurts, suffering, pain, and needs of others. *Why?* That we might learn empathy and that we might pray all the more earnestly, "Thy kingdom come" (Matthew 6:10). So, if you wish to be used of God, see the world form *His* vantage point, through His eyes.

If you want to be used of God... Let Him hear through your ears

Revelation 2:11: "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches...." Turnabout is fair play: if you would have God hear you when you pray, you must hear Him when He speaks. He speaks to us through His Word, the Bible.

By contrast, most TV programs promote non-Christian values: foul language, illicit sex, and wanton acts of violence are common. These are not the kinds of things a Christian should be seeing and listening to. The Scriptures ask us, "How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher" (Romans 10:14). Verse 18 concludes, "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." Whose words? God's words! God's words are what we should feed our eyes and ears with, not the time-wasting scoria and swill that pours into millions of living rooms nightly via "hellevision." Jesus assured us, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me" (John 10:27). "He that is of God heareth"-what?-"God's words ... " (John 8:47)! Are you spiritually attuned to God's words or are you tuned into the wavelengths of this world? If any man have an ear, let him hear.

God would also have us use our ears to hear the cries of the lost, the frustrated, and the needy so that you may help and pray for them.

If you earnestly desire to be used of God, use *your* ears as God does: listen to the words of God and wholesome things.

If you want to be used of God... Let God speak through your voice

Matthew 10:20 says, "For it is not ye that *speak*, but the Spirit of your Father which *speaketh* in you."

How do we use our voice? Do we use our lips to build, uplift, and edify? Or are we too often caught up voicing gossip, rumors, and dissension? Proverbs 14:1 states that "Every wise woman buildeth her house: but the foolish plucketh it down with her hands." We tear down our house, church, or family by constant nagging, bickering, rumor-mongering, and gossip. Gossip is like mud thrown on a clean white wall: it may not stick, but it always leaves a dirty mark. For example, if we were to begin a rumor that old Mr. So-and-so was seen on Broadway making love to a kangaroo, people may scoff. Mr. Soand-So may have an iron-clad alibi, and besides, he may not like kangaroos anyway. But you can take it to the bank that *some*day, *somewhere*, *someone* will meet old Mr. So-and-So and reflect, "Mr. So-and-So...let's see...your name is familiar...oh, yes! You were the guy down on Broadway with the kangaroo!" Get the point? We need to praise and uplift. God's church needs builders, not a wrecking crew.

Also, God wants to hear your voice through prayer (Luke 18:1). "Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you" (1 Thessalonians 5:17). There is no better way you can use your voice. Colossians 3:16 advises, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord."

God also speaks His words through the teachers and ministers He sends. Do we hear their voice? Do we appreciate them? Or do we take them for granted? Thousand of people would give nearly anything to hear what your ears hear through the Church of God International. Unfortunately, it is a true saying that "familiarity breeds contempt." Some will nit-pick, fault-find, and complain because, perhaps, a minister "seems boring," or perhaps mispronounces a word or misquotes a fact or a scripture, and completely shut out the gist of his message. Stop and consider: how would you feel if God's servants were suddenly taken from you? Do we sometimes unintentionally undermine the inspiration God sends by misuse of our tongues? Or do we have the attitude of Isaiah 52:7: "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace; that bringeth good tidings of good, that publisheth salvation; that saith unto Zion, Thy God reigneth!"

We need to realize God may even sometimes use *us* as His witnesses to give testimony if we are humble before Him! We are told in 1 Peter 3:15, "But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an *answer* to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear." If you truly wish to be used of God, let him speak through *your* voice.

If you want to be used of God...

Let Him work through your hands

Matthew 9:37 reminds us that "the harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few." We might add, "Ooohhh, so very few!" Willing workers are needed in the Master's vineyard-people who are willing to be used of God to serve others. Christianity is a roll-up-your-sleeves-andget-involved religion. "Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone" (James 2:17). When you are willing to use your hands to assist in God's work-even if it's only your job to pay tithes or give offerings to God's work-God will notice, and you will be blessed. Consider Malachi 3:10: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the LORD of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." We are told in Matthew 6:33, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Will you accept God's challenge?

And if you are one of those fortunate enough to attend a weekly Sabbath service, be a doer, not just a taker. Chip in. Get involved. If you see that something needs to be done, just do it. Even if it is only picking up hymnals, or giving someone a ride to services, or writing a note or card of encouragement to someone who is sick or less fortunate than you. We are family, and that is what family is all about. It is true that many hands make light work, so

Let's see if you who have been behind the wheel of La car can relate to this familiar scenario.

You tool along all by yourself in your car to work, school, a meeting, or while running an errand. Nine times out ten, you left a little later than you should have. Here you are in a rush. It's kind of like the country-western song that goes. "I'm in a hurry to get things done, I rush and rush 'til life's no fun.' Anyway, there you are, all alone with your radio tuned to your favorite station, seat adjusted to your lik-



ing with seatbelt fastened, the windows rolled up with the temperature adjusted just so. and doing the speed limit (or a little above). Life is just ducky as you roll along

Whoa! Here's a car coming over into your lane in front of you, or coming out of a side road, or slowing down in front of you. How dare they cut you off! Now your peaceful, self-centered world has been invaded. You cannot conveniently get around that car no matter how hard you try. Doesn't he know you were there first and that he should get out of your way? This has got to be the stupidest driver you have ever encountered. You are busily telling him off by calling him names, giving him "hand signs" and feeling much superior to him as you finally maneuver around him and speed off in your "getaway car," still murmuring about him, feeling pretty much justified in all your actions Are you justified?

Just what should you do since you call yourself a Christian? Let's analyze this and get some pointers.

· First, I have to remember that the person in front of me is not a car, but a person.

· Next I must treat them with dignity, as I would if that person were my mother, father, or someone else I respect. I need to think that maybe my actions in this situation, if met with patience, may lighten the stress of that person's day.

· I must try to remember how nice it is when someone treats me with courtesy in traffic and how upset I get if I am treated badly. Hate begets hate and kindness begets kindness.

• I must not call any names, no matter how frustrated or impatient I get. This is not for their benefit only; but mine as well. It demeans my character when I don't guard my tongue.

· I must realize that a few more minutes either way is not that important in the long haul. (If time is of the essence, I need to plan to leave earlier on a regular basis so I can take the time to be courteous.)

· I have to remember this is not my "getaway car" after I have committed these acts which tear down my character. Actually, I would not have gotten away with anything, as Jesus Christ sees all and knows my heart.

The car, which we have plenty of opportunity to use, is a great training ground to build good character. Practice these rules every day. God wants to give us the power that created this universe and more, so He has to be confident that we will not misuse that power. He is watching and evaluating!

I am convinced that if I can be a Christian in my car, all by myself, I can be a Christian anywhere. To work or home is just a few short miles, but these miles can be turned into eternal, good character.

lend a hand. By analogy, God's church is compared to a bride, and, like a new groom who goes out of his way to help, He provides for and comforts His new bride, so we should do all in our power to be of assistance to others. So, if you indeed wish to be used of God, let Him work through your hands.

If you want to be used of God... Let Him walk through your feet

Proverbs 4:26 advises, "Ponder the path of thy feet, and let all thy ways be established." An essential part of our Christian armor is "feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace" (Ephesians 6:15). "He that saith he abideth in Him ought himself also so to walk, even as he walked" (1 John 2:6). In other words, we ought to "walk the walk," not just talk the talk.

Your feet represent your walk, your life-style, the way you live your life.

Why not let God have your life? He can do more with it than you can, anyway. An old favorite hymn is entitled "Wherever He Leads, I'll Go." Do we? Are we really willing to follow Christ wherever He leads? Or do we sometimes get caught up in an impasse and say, "Whoa! Stop! That's enough! Why, if I keep the Sabbath and the holy days, I'll lose my job! If I don't keep Christmas and Easter, my family will think I've lost my sanity. And if I stop going out with my friends to some of those occasions, they'll think I've become a religious fanatic!" What, dear friend, is your sticking point? Where do you draw the line in your obedience to Christ? What is it that may cause you to compromise or rebel? Is it a habit, a secret lust, or some embedded custom that you refuse to give up? It is amazing to what extent our minds will go to rationalize our sinful thoughts and behaviors! Why? "Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be" (Romans 8:7). God will only bless you up to your last point of obedience because He cannot-He will notbless your disobedience. We must always remember that we are the clay and He, God, is the Potter (Isaiah 64:8). We are to yield to His leading and direction, and not be like one popular singer who crooned boastfully, "I did it MY way!" Let's do it God's way, instead!

God seeks the lost, the hopeless, and the helpless. Do you? Do we go out of our way to help others in a right attitude? Or are we sometimes like the self-righteous Pharisee who crossed over to the other side of the street to avoid involvement (Luke 10:30-32)? "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin" (James 4:17). God needs your feet to go, to work, and to live for Him. Trust Him for guidance. Psalm 119:105 tells us, "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path."

We are asked in Romans 10:15, "And how shall they preach, except they be sent? As it is written, How beautiful are the *feet* of them that preach the gospel of peace. and bring glad tidings of good things!" If you would be used of God, set the example: allow Him to go through vour feet.

If you want to be used of God Let Him love through your heart

First John 4:7 implores us, "Beloved, let us love one another." We are told plainly in Matthew 22:37,39, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind ... and thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

Love is a built-in psychological need. Every person needs to love and to be loved. Even you. Even me. Even our leaders. And, yes, even our enemies. This writer must confess, however, that he sometimes has an ulterior motive when praying for his enemies. He knows that if God would answer the prayer that his enemies prosper and be in health-as we would have others pray for usand the prayer that they would come to understand those things we understand, and come to live for and love God as we strive to do, then we will in time find that our enemies are no longer our enemies, but our brothers in Christ instead! Brethren, pray for one another

When God measures a man, He puts the tape around his heart instead of his head. God marks those who "sigh and that cry for all the abominations that be done in the midst thereof" (Ezekiel 9:4). Do we? We need to let God's love reach out through us to meet the needs of the world. In its final analysis, the gospel message is a message of love.

At baptism we TOTALLY COMMIT. We pledge before God and His angels that we acknowledge our sins, that we repent of them, and that we accept Jesus Christ as our personal Savior. We are truly humbled as we come to recognize that we are bought with a price: the blood of Jesus Christ who bled and died for us-in our stead (1Corinthians 6:20). We need to maintain that commitment, that fire, that zeal, and that dedication, and not allow ourselves to grow negligent, indifferent, or lukewarm. Jesus Christ Himself tells us to "hold that fast which thou hast, that no man take thy crown" (Revelation 3.11)

In summation, if you will do these things, if you will

· let God think through your mind ...

- see through your eyes.
- · hear through your ears ...
- · speak through your voice
- work through you hands ...
- walk through your feet ... and
- · love through your heart ...

that is, if you will totally commit your life to Jesus Christ and develop an uncompromising, passionate love for the truth-you will soon find that you are being used of God!

Testimony of new member in Body of Christ

y parents raised us as Catholics. We were unaware of God's plan for mankind. My father subscribed to the Plain Truth magazine in the early 1970s. Early in the 1980s, my parents came to understand that the Sabbath day was Friday sundown until Saturday sundown, and that it-not Sunday-was and is God's day for mankind to worship Him.

Where my mother was employed, she had to work on Saturdays when a holiday fell on a weekday. If you didn't work on Saturday, you would not be paid for the holiday. During the years of 1991 and 1992, I started reading some of my father's old Worldwide Church of God books and decided to look into many religions to find God's true church. I believe God has answered my prayers through the Church of God International.

We stopped keeping Christmas, Easter, Halloween, etc., in 1992. I was surprised that the SDAs kept these holidays, and, though I wanted to be baptized, I delayed until I knew what repentance, baptism, and the laying on of hands meant. I started requesting and receiving booklets and tapes in 1995. I came to believe that the Church of God International was being led by the Holy Spirit. In 1997, I counseled with minister Ken Register

and he showed me from the Holy Bible answers to my questions.

I was still putting off baptism for some reason unknown to me. Looking back, I believe Satan was a major factor. The aspect of his character that I admired most was that he was truthful and kind.

It has been a rough couple of years. Bob needed more and more attention as his emphysema grew worse. I have never considered myself to be much of a nurse; but as I kept telling Bob when he would see me have to do so much for us, "You ain't heavy—you're my brother!" I now know the true meaning of those words.

Bob was my spiritual brother and also the very "love of my life." He left me with a lot of good reasons to go on, and, indeed, that has not been easy.

My brothers and sisters have been so supportive. They loved Bob very much. My church family, which is my family "in deed," have taken care of me here in Nashville. Almost all of the members of the Nashville congregation came to Bob's funeral in Paducah, Kentucky.

Most of all, God has given me strength and peace of mind to go on because of all the prayers on my behalf.

Bob was baptized in March of 1993 after having attended church since August of 1992. He was very loyal about coming to worship services until the last year or two of his life.
