n the second book to Timothy, Paul writes: "This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, Without natural affection, trucebreakers, false

accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, Traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God; Having a form of godliness [reli-


gion], but denying the power thereof: from such turn away. For of this sort are they which creep into houses and lead captive silly women laden with sins, led away with divers lusts, Ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth" (2 Timothy 3:1–7).

What Paul is describing are the varieties of character flaws and behaviors that result from the love of so many waxing cold. Unfortunately, our twenty-first century culture provides an enormous amount of additional "tools for addiction" that can be used to trigger or enable the many characteristics Paul lists. So often, because we don't control these tools of addiction in our lives as we should, they make it easier and more natural for us to fall into these proclivities so appealing to our human nature.

Throughout mankind's history, there have been many kinds of enablers. Sadly, religion has contributed immensely to the abuses humanity has incurred upon himself. But there are many more: alcohol, drugs, sex, pornography, and of course, money. Additionally, there are unhealthy relationships, narcissism, sociopaths, egocentricity, power, fame, popularity, avarice, and greed. There are *intrinsic* items in our lives like clothes, cars, boats, planes, and homes-even our educational level, or perhaps the possession of a weapon. They all contribute to our failure and consequent expression of these characteristics listed in 2 Timothy 3. So many things enable and drive us into triggering specific inclinations in our character that far too often lean toward igniting our selfish weaknesses and/or flaws. It's just the nature of things in the world in which we live.

Many of the "triggers" or "enablers" that surround us have been around for a very long time-since the beginning of mankind's creation. Surely, we can recognize or think of a variety of catalysts that have *plagued* and *tempted* humanity down through the centuries. However, there is a new item that has recently emerged just over the last two to three decades, creating a whole new type of addiction with multiple listings of "syndromes" and/or "disorder" labels that has created a whole new type of social disruption. Do you know what it is?

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Babylon—Then and Now?

B the waters of the Euphrates River in modern-day Iraq, archaeologists for many years have been excavating the ruins of ancient Babylon.

The city Babylon, in the kingdom of Babylonia, had its origins in about 2246 BC with Nimrod and the Tower of Babel (Genesis 10 and 11). Babylon's walls attained a height of 300 feet and

thickness of 50 feet! Its circumference was about 50 miles. It also had a man-made lake 40 miles square. The Hanging Gardens, a wonder of the ancient world, was only one of its many incredible edifices! Babylon's Temple of Baal was a half-mile square and 600 feet tall. Babylon, for centuries, represented the pinnacle of man's power—the arts, religion, science, military might, and finance. "Babylon" in Hebrew means *confusion*—and confusion in its many biblical references always means instability, emptiness, shame, and disorder—the result of man living physically and spiritually cut off from his Creator. That is a definition of the entire world's system of living and governing both throughout history and *especially* today! By the time the prophet Daniel lived there during the Jewish captivity, Babylon was in decline. The handwriting was indeed on the wall (Daniel 5) looking toward its conquest by Cyrus in 539 BC. Babylonia then became part of many succeeding empires.

Six hundred years later, in about AD 90, the aged apostle John received visions which he wrote as the book of Revelation. In it is described a yet future time of Babylon's fall (Revelation 18). We do understand that at the end time there will be a superpower resembling ancient Babylon, but we can also apply these verses to mankind's societies throughout history. Indeed, Babylon has been with us in essence for these thousands of years—just as sin is typified as Egypt! Christians live in enemy territory—we eat, drink, think, see, hear, and breathe Babylon every day! Once we realize this, many scriptures will make even more sense to us, such as Jesus Christ's admonition to "watch" (Matthew 24:42). Thanks to both mankind and the spiritual ruler of this world, Satan, along with his billions of demon helpers, we are indeed in a modern-day Babylonish system! *All* this world's philosophy, religion, science, agriculture, food sources, entertainment, politics, media, and governments reek of Babylon (Revelation 17:5)!

Personal Evangelism

Believe it or not, NOT everyone is welcomed into God's church! Some branches of the Church of God culture insist on screening or processing those who may wish to attend Sabbath services to see if they are good enough, knowledgeable enough, spiritual enough, or agree with their every doctrinal whim! We sharply disagree!

T he Church of God International encourages personal evangelism. To "evangelize" means to proclaim the good news of the Gospel of Christ.

The Gospel includes the history of the birth, life, actions, death, resurrection, ascension, and doctrines of Jesus Christ. It includes the revelation of the grace of God to sinful man through the mediator Jesus Christ. It includes the character, actions, and doctrines of Christ, with the whole scheme of salvation, as revealed by Christ and His apostles. It includes the good news of the world tomorrow—the literal kingdom or government of God upon the earth at Christ's triumphal return. This Gospel is said to have been preached to Abraham by the promise, "in thee shall all nations be blessed" (Galatians 3:8).

Jesus gave the Great Commission to His twelve apostles in Matthew 28:18–20 and Mark 16:15–16.

The question sometimes arises, Did Jesus mean this Great Commission *only* for His twelve disciples as some preterist's believe, or does this include each and every one of us? We firmly believe that we *also* are under this obligation to teach others. How are we doing, Christians?

Polls and statistics tell us that across the countries, churches are steadily shrinking. The *most common* reason people COME to church is to find answers to puzzling questions. And the churches of this world do not have the answers! Brethren, God's Word, the Bible, *has* the answers! Are we, Christ's followers, *too timid* to share them?

Remember that the early church never had the benefit of radio, TV, or the printing press. For centuries, the Gospel—the faith once delivered—was communicated only by painstakingly hand-copied duplicates of the Bible and by word of mouth—by personal evangelism!

But are we to assume God has stopped giving the increase? No, God doesn't change (Malachi 3:6; Hebrews 13:8).

Statistics show that fully 87 percent of people who attend church services are there because someone else INVITED them! It would be safe to say that there are people reading these words who attend Sabbath services because someone else INVITED them!

Several years ago, a minister asked a group of about 12,000 people, "How many are here because they heard the broadcast?" Many hands went up. "How many are here because they saw our literature?" More hands went up. "How many are here because of a personal contact?" MOST hands went up!

It should be pointed out that if every person in your congregations would personally invite just ONE person a year, we would *double* in size in one year! And if each of these persons invited just *one* other person a year we would double again. We would begin to grow exponentially!

We read in Acts 2:41 that about 3,000 souls were added in one day! Of course, we know God gives the increase (1 Corinthians 3:7). Verse 47 goes on to say, "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved."

In 1 Peter 4:17 the question is asked, "What shall be the end of those who do not obey the Gospel?" If people have not heard and learned the Gospel, they cannot *obey* it. Could it be that some of the problem today rests with us? Do we just pay our tithes and then sit back and expect the ministry to do all the evangelizing?

Even when the early Church was being heavily persecuted—some even unto death—we read in Acts 8:4, "Therefore those who were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the Word." What stops us today? Where is our motivation? We are not being persecuted. We have many more advantages. We have the automobile, the airplane, the telephone, the bicycle, the Internet, and the printed page. We are without excuse.

Reaching the lost is the "work" the Lord has commanded each of us to do. It is our job assignment, our commission, our mission. Evangelism is not only to be done in distant lands, but we must also teach those near us as well. Successful evangelism is accomplished *one person at a time*.

We all know somebody, don't we? A family member, a co-worker, a friend, a neighbor, or even a stranger we meet. Paul said, "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation." Are we ashamed? Shy? Bashful? Timid? Fearful? What is our excuse? Time and time again, we are told in the Scriptures, "Be strong and very courageous!" How will we answer Christ when He asks us how many lost souls we have personally witnessed to, how many we invited to Sabbath services? Will you hem and haw and stutter something like, "Well, I paid my tithes and prayed for increase?" Or will you be able to give Him a positive number?

What is the Gospel?

- It is called the Gospel of the Kingdom of God in Matthew 24:15.
- It is called the Gospel of God in Romans 1.1.
- It is called the Gospel of Christ. Romans 1.16.
- It is called the Gospel of his Son in Romans 1:9.
- It is called the Gospel of the grace of God in Acts 20:24.
- It is called the Gospel of peace in Romans 10:15.
- It is called the glorious Gospel of the blessed God in 1 Timothy 1:11.
- It is called the Gospel of salvation in Ephesians 1.13.

No excuses!

Many of us rationalize, "But I am not an outgoing person," or "I don't know how," or "I never had the opportunity." Will Jesus Christ accept such weak excuses? What have we got to lose?

We can begin anywhere. We can use world events as a lead-in, then show people that there is good news—there are answers. We can begin by sharing our own miraculous calling, how God has blessed us, and share the vision of what God has in store for all mankind. Tell them about the conditions in the Millennium. We use the Ten Commandments one by one to show that everyone is a sinner, that none of us can keep them; therefore, all of us need Jesus as our Savior. Once people understand they are sinners and their own goodness cannot save them, they are more willing to repent (change their mind) and trust Jesus Christ as Savior.

Sometimes witnessing for Jesus can be discouraging because we don't always see immediate results. We are programmed to expect instant gratification. But sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ with others doesn't always give us instant results. Only one in five people will respond the first time you invite them to church, but don't give up. Some will respond only after several invites.

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Paul says in 1 Corinthians 9:16, "WOE is to me if I preach not the Gospel." How are people going to answer the Gospel call if we, God's people, haven't bothered to tell the good news to others?

In the first century, the good news of the Gospel caused great excitement! We need to be just as excited today! Let our lights shine! They told and taught things they knew—things they saw and heard with their own eyes and ears. If we have been attending Sabbath services for any length of time at all, if we have read the literature available, we are virtual warehouses of biblical knowledge! Others are literally *dying* to know what you know! We need to tell others what we know and have proven. Personal evangelism is something we can DO for the church! What a wonderful reward we have when we lead someone to the truth! "Let him know, that he which converteth the sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins" (James 5:20). If we talk to others about Jesus Christ but our life contradicts our words, people won't believe our testimony. Jesus said, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Matthew 5:16).

Jesus says in Matthew 9:37–38, "The harvest truly is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest." Paul admonished, "These things speak, and exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no man despise thee" (Titus 2:15).

Come on, Christian, LET'S GO DO OUR JOB!

What Does It Take To Melt Your Heart?

Have you ever heard the old saying, "Everybody has at least one personal story that would break your heart?" If you think about it, that statement is very true. We have all experienced hurts and emotional wounds in the course of our lives. We all have scar tissue from living this life we live. In fact, I think it is safe to say that it is almost impossible to avoid at least a couple of these hurts during the course of even

a privileged life span on this planet. Think about it. Over the course of our lives, we survive a thousand shocks, disappointments, failures, injustices, attacks, and abuses.

What is the cumulative impact of all of those hurts? What do we say? "What doesn't kill you makes you stronger!" As we grow older, the skin gets thicker. The scar tissue forms. We develop calluses. We erect walls around our hearts to protect them from further attacks or hurts. That is how most of us have learned to survive. To one extent or another, most of us grow colder and more remote over time.

Have you ever observed just how different most adults are from children? With most children, the emotions are very near the surface. Affection comes easily for them. A smile or giggle is easily provoked from a child. Tears flow freely. However, it is not that way for most adults.

That is why this article is entitled, *What Does It Take To Melt Your Heart?* What does it take to get past that scar tissue and to penetrate all of those hurts? Moreover, this is an extremely important question because of something Jesus Christ once said.

We read: "People were bringing little children to Jesus to have him touch them, but the disciples rebuked them. When Jesus saw this, he was indignant. He said to them, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. I tell you the truth, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child WILL NEVER ENTER IT.' And he took the children in his arms, put his hands on them and blessed them" (Mark 10:13–16, NIV here and throughout article).

So why did Christ say we must receive the Kingdom of God like a small child? Even a small child can be extremely selfish and cruel. What is it about them that God wants us to emulate?

It is their VULNERABILITY. Children are still capable of being reached. They are still able to feel and connect. In short, they have not been spoiled by this life yet. They have not had the time to build all of those walls around themselves. They have not yet been scarred by a thousand hurts and slights. They are still open to love and be loved. Most of them are not even worried about getting hurt.

Now let us contrast that with the adults we see when we look in the mirror. We have built those walls. We have developed that scar tissue and calluses. We hold grudges. We refuse to allow ourselves to forgive ourselves and each other. "I've been hurt, and I'm not going to allow that to hurt me again," we tell ourselves. We hold onto it like a dog holds onto a bone.

Peter once asked the Lord how often he should forgive someone who had sinned against him (Matthew 18:21). "'Up to seven times?' he asked. 'I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times (or seventy times seven)," Christ replied (Matthew 18:22). He then proceeded to tell His disciples the parable about the unmerciful servant (Matthew 18:23–34). In this illustration, the master had forgiven his servant a great debt. Later, that same servant went out and demanded the payment of a much smaller debt that was owed him by one of his coworkers. When the master heard about what had happened, he had that unmerciful servant thrown in jail and reinstated the large debt which he had previously forgiven. "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother FROM YOUR HEART," Christ concluded (Matthew 18:35).

THAT YOU MAY LOVE HIM WITH ALL YOUR HEART AND WITH ALL YOUR SOUL, and live" (Deuteronomy 30:6).

Ezekiel also predicted that God would allow the Israelites to return to their homeland one day (Ezekiel 11:16–17). He reported that God had told him: "I will give them an undivided heart and put a new spirit in them; I will remove from them their heart of stone and give them a heart of flesh" (Ezekiel 11:19). Moreover, he repeated this prediction later on in his book (Ezekiel 36:24–28).

Jesus once quoted a passage from Isaiah in describing why the people of His day could not understand His parables (Matthew 13:13–17). Notice that Christ said His disciples could see and hear. Their hearts were open to what He was telling them.

Brethren, when we come to Christ, we have to make ourselves vulnerable again. We have to literally open our hearts to Him. The Israelites would rip their clothing to express their sorrow and repentance, but notice what the prophet Joel told them: "Even now, declares the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning. Rend your heart and not your garments" (Joel 2:12–13).

We are told in the book of Acts that when the people heard Peter's message on Pentecost, "they were pricked in their heart" (Acts 2:37). David said, "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit" (Psalm 34:18). He went on to say, "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise" (Psalm 51:17). In evaluating people, we are told that the Lord looks on the heart (1 Samuel 16:7). We are also told that "the word of God is living and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart" (Hebrews 4:12).

Brethren, God's message to us is clear: If we want to connect with Him, we have to make ourselves vulnerable again. We have to tear down the walls and cut away all of the scar tissue and remove those calluses we have developed over the years.

The prophet Jeremiah said: "Circumcise yourselves to the LORD, circumcise your hearts, you men of Judah and people of Jerusalem..." (Jeremiah 4:4). When Stephen was preaching to the Council before he was stoned to death, he said: "You stiff-necked people, with uncircumcised hearts and ears" (Acts 7:51)! Paul told the Romans, "No, a man is a Jew if he is one inwardly; and circumcision is circumcision of the heart, by the Spirit, not by the written code" (Romans 2:29).

Brethren, the message is clear: If we want to be with God, we have to cut away all of that flesh. God has to be able to penetrate that thick stony covering that we have erected around our hearts!

Many of us came out of a tradition that made fun of any notions of "giving your heart to the Lord." Brethren, that was wrong! The truth is, if you don't open your heart, you won't be in God's Kingdom! This is made plain in the epistle to the Hebrews: "So as the Holy Spirit says: 'Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts as you did in the rebellion during the time of testing in the desert, where your fathers tested and tried me and for forty years saw what I did. That is why I was angry with that generation, and I said, 'Their hearts are always going astray, and they have not known my ways.' So I declared on oath in my anger, 'They shall never enter my rest.' See to it brothers, that none of you has a sinful, unbelieving heart that turns away from the living God. But encourage one another daily, as long as it is called Today, so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness. We have come to share in Christ if we hold firmly till the end the confidence we had at first. As has just been said: 'TODAY, IF YOU HEAR HIS VOICE, DO NOT HARDEN YOUR HEARTS AS YOU DID IN THE REBELLION'" (Hebrews 3:7–15).

Jesus Christ's heart was reachable. Remember the story about when Lazarus died (John 11)? Why did Christ weep? He knew that He was about to resurrect this man. The answer is that He was touched by the grief



We see people in need and convince ourselves that they do not need our help. And yet, we are told in Scripture: "If there is a poor man among your brothers in any of the towns of the land that the Lord your God is giving you, do not be HARDHEARTED or tightfisted toward your poor brother" (Deuteronomy 15:7). Over and over again, God enjoins His people to open their hearts to each other and to Him.

In fact, the Bible has a great deal to say about preparing our hearts to receive God. Let's notice a few of those scriptures.

Moses instructed the children of Israel to "Circumcise your hearts, therefore, and do not be stiff-necked any longer" (Deuteronomy 10:16). Moses also prophesied about the future. He foretold the time when the Israelites would abandon God, and He would allow them to go into captivity (Deuteronomy 30). He also promised that the Lord would bring them back to their home when they repented. Moses said: "The LORD your God will circumcise your hearts and the hearts of your descendants, SO

of those people.

Brethren, the kind of vulnerability that God expects from us is not easy. If it was easy, there would be billions of people in the first resurrection!

For example, an old friend in that organization was "on fire," zealous for the Truth. He had a fantastic memory for reciting Scripture, was very meticulous, almost fanatical about keeping the letter of the law and, as time went on, became almost Pharisaical in self-righteousness. Unfortunately, he lost it all. He quit the organization and eventually turned against it. He is now in the grave awaiting a resurrection.

Have you ever wondered how those who once *knew* the Truth so completely can lose sight of it? How does that *happen*? There may be various reasons, but in this article I want to show you one of the major reasons that so many have "lost it" and what *you* can do to *keep* from losing it.

Just What Do You Mean, "Compromise"?

When we break down the word "compromise," we have *com*, which means "with," "combine," or "co-mingle," and the word *promise*. Put together, compromise means "with promise." There is always a promise of a

Brethren, I cannot begin to put into words what that meant to us. To say that your reactions touched our hearts does not seem sufficient. It made a bad situation better. Even so, when it was all over, we slowly went back to our everyday routines and pushed aside our thoughts and feelings about what had happened. Why is it that we can only let our defenses down for a little while?

Nevertheless, we must open our hearts to God and to each other. It is the only way we are truly going to survive this life. It is only through making ourselves vulnerable again that we can truly achieve what God expects of us.

When Jesus was asked about the greatest commandment in the Law, He replied: "Love the Lord your God WITH ALL YOUR HEART AND WITH ALL YOU SOUL AND WITH ALL YOUR MIND. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself. All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments" (Matthew 22:37–40). benefit. Most sin starts out as "fun," enjoyable, or in some way beneficial. We generally compromise because we want *our* way instead of *God's* way. Some synonyms for compromise are: accommodation, arrangement, settlement, bargain, and middle ground. Society has conditioned us to believe compromise is a *good* thing—and it CAN be, for instance in the case of company/union negotiations—but NOT in a Christian's life!

Upon reflection, compromise is what caused the sin of Adam and Eve. They once *knew* God and had a personal relationship with Him. Then they began to listen to an outside influence—the serpent. They visualized the *benefits* of disobeying God—believing that they could someday be as God. They were deceived—they believed a lie as opposed to divine revelation. They sinned—transgressed the law of what God said. THEY COMPROMISED!

Likewise, Esau sold his birthright to Jacob for a bowl of red pottage (Genesis 25:27–34). HE COMPROMISED!

God revealed Himself to the fledgling nation of Israel. He gave them His Ten Commandments. "And all the people saw the thunderings, and the lightnings, and the noise of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking: and when the people saw *it*, they removed, and stood afar off" (Exodus 20:18). They said, "...All that the Lord hath said will we do, and be obedient" (Exodus 24:7). They were led, fed, instructed, and protected by God for 40 years in the wilderness (Deuteronomy 8:2), yet they murmured, broke the Sabbath, and sinned repeatedly. They knew the truth and yet they still compromised by failing to obey.

Even wise King Solomon COMPROMISED by multiplying wives to himself, against God's commandment: "Neither shall he [the king] multiply wives to himself, that his heart turn not away" (Deuteronomy 17:17). "But king Solomon loved many strange women..." (1 Kings 11:1). The result? "For it came to pass, when Solomon was old, that his wives turned away his heart after other gods..." (verse 4). HE COMPROMISED!

Samson disclosed the secret to his enormous strength for the favors of Delilah. By divulging his secret and allowing his hair to be cut, Samson disregarded his Nazarite vow and thus severed his covenant with God (Judges 16:16–20). As a consequence, God finally withdrew his supernatural strength. Samson COMPROMISED!

Moses was an example of one who refused to compromise: "Choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season" (Hebrews 11:25).

Let's Be Honest!

Let's be honest: there are some things that we, as Christians, *know* are contrary to God's will, and we do them anyway. True or false?

One of Satan's most effective weapons against the people of God has always been the appeal to compromise. We slip and slide and try to maneuver around what we KNOW from God's Word! We want *our* way over *God's* way. We often start out by rationalizing that our situation is different, and justify it by invoking the "ox in the ditch" excuse. Now, Satan the devil *knows* that God's people are not likely to go out and commit a horrendous sin—rob a bank, blackmail, or murder someone. But if he can nudge or move a Christian to give in—compromise—A LITTLE BIT AT A TIME, INCH-BY-INCH BY CREEPING INCREMENTALISM, he has them on a slippery slope! After all, we *all* know the way back to Babylon—back into the chaos, confusion, and morass of the world that we came out of!

The message of the world is: "Relax! Take it easy. Don't be a fanatic. After all, God understands." It says, "I'll scratch your back if you'll scratch mine." "You read my stuff, and I'll read yours." "You come to my church, and I'll come to yours." It says, "All these churches can't be wrong" "Trust me, I wouldn't steer you wrong-and look at all these wonderful people and all these great benefits!" Brethren, beware! Compromise is like leaven; a little leaven leavens the whole lump (1 Corinthians 5:6; Galatians 5:9). That's what happened to a major branch of God's Church within the lifetimes of most of us! Little by little they were given "alternative understandings" to what the Word of God plainly said! The doctrines of God are all linked together; when you change one, like toppling dominoes, each affects another, and another, until one's entire belief system is altered. In due time, the "new, changed, improved, enlightened, and liberated" church is barely recognizable from what it had been. Within a short space of time, many of the pagan doctrines God's called-out ones once universally abhorred was repackaged, relabeled, perfumed, gift-wrapped and promoted as though it had great value. What took hundreds of years in the past was accomplished in a single generation.

Brethren, we need to be tearing down those walls that we have erected every day of our lives. We need to be cutting away that scar tissue and allowing ourselves to feel again. We need to use all of our hearts in loving the Lord and each other, not just some little corner or piece around the edges. Our profession is a full-time occupation, and our employer demands all of our energy, attention, and devotion. For the true Christian, religion is not just a piece of his/her life.

It will not be easy. It is hard to let down our defenses. Even so, we have to try, because that is what our Heavenly Father expects from us. That is what He has called us to do. So brethren, I ask again: *What does it take to melt your heart?* Ω

It's the digital invasion, or more specifically, "Internet addiction," professionally labeled as Internet Addiction Disorder (IAD).

Invasion of the Megabites

There is a very serious concern among men-

tal health professionals that this invasion, with all of the inherent attractions and temptations that come from our curiosities and competitiveness to participate in an endless number of games and to traffic in an unlimited amount of information, will rob us of our connection to the sensitivities reality requires. This newly created "cyber world," with its Internet and prodigious amounts of digital gadgets and apps, is indeed changing our brains as well as our behavior and habits, and has become the newest, most modern "tool of addiction."

Clearly, a whole new variety of addictions have emerged-and the fastest among these digital pathologies topping the list is pornography. World-renowned Christian apologist, author, and radio commentator, Josh McDowell, said: "The greatest threat to the body of Christ, to the church, to families, and to the individual Christian is the pervasive, destructive pornography available through the Internet. An insidious intruder is putting your children at risk. It is systematically stalking your children and, sadly, most parents and Christian leaders are oblivious to it."

Though this is unquestionably true, the fact is, there are *multiple fronts* of attack that we as individuals and families are contending with from this invasive intruder, IAD. A quick comparison of the year 2000 with 2010 illustrates the magnitude of this growing threat and the potential impact it's had on our lifestyles, mental health, and emotional balance. Notice the

explosive increase over this 10-year period.

We spent an average of 2.7 hours daily online, compared to 18 hours in 2010; 100 million daily Google searches, compared to 2 billion previously; 12 billion daily emails, compared to 247 billion in 2010; 12,000 daily blogs, compared to 141 million; 0 iTunes, compared to 10 billion downloads in 2010; 0 daily Tweets, compared to 50 million; 0 daily YouTube videos, compared to 4 billion in 2010; 0 people on Facebook, compared to 600 million in 2010. This is an astonishing comparison between the years 2000 and 2010! One cannot deny our lives have been severely

changed, and not always for the better! Let me illustrate some of the "fruit" of this new social intruder, IAD.

Just a few decades ago, in order to get the adrenaline high that was obtained solely from things like alcohol, drugs, or sex—it's a fact that now, one can achieve the same result by simply going online! That's right—with just one "click," you can be exposed to a myriad of powerful subjects, images, and/or videos that are potentially lethal in their addictive attraction.

Interestingly enough, an expert in the study of this field, and member of the American Psychological Association, Dr. Kimberly Young, presented a very pointed warning in 1995-that's right, 1995!-in a paper she authored, titled Internet Addiction: The Emergence of a New Disorder. Her early research disclosed, "Marriages, dating relationships, parent-child relationships, and close friendships were being disrupted by excessive use of the Internet. Dependents gradually spent less time with real people in their lives in exchange for solitary time in front of a computer."

This goes to substantiate the American Journal of Psychiatry's opinion that this now appears to be a very common new disorder. And though there has yet to be a confirmed formal diagnostic category, it is anticipated that IAD will be included in the up and coming fifth edition of the *Diagnostic*

most to them, in exchange for the adrenaline high that comes from the virtual reality of cyberspace.

According to many of the most recent statistics, our children, young mothers, middle-aged to older married couples, and single people are most vulnerable. Most of these IAD's manifest in the following digital addictions: cybersex, cyber affairs, arranging dates via services, sexting, cyber bullying, Internet gambling, Internet video gaming, texting, and social media accessing. And the list keeps growing as technology develops and grows.

So What's the Risk?

Many who are involved and "online" do not see the risks that lurk within the cyberspace media frenzy. They view it as a convenient way to conduct business, socialize, pass the time away, or just meet new friends. It is very easy for IAD to cause one to neglect his family, physically and/or emotionally. Marriages can become estranged, especially if the time spent is used for sexting, cybersex, pornography, etc. It can infringe on your career and cause work-related problems, which can lead to financial issues and perhaps even bankruptcy-especially if compounded by allowing the ease of online shopping and/or gambling to get out of hand. And most


recently, research has proved that personalities can change and one may even take on different personas, adding to identity crisis and personality disorders, especially while online.

Growing evidence is beginning to show that digital addictions can actually change the functioning of the brain, which may result in some possible damage. When IAD becomes obsessive/compulsive, it has much in common with other addictions. Here are four points to consider: First, if you are compelled to participate in the activity excessively, then you should take action to reduce your time spent on the device. Secondly, if upon stopping, or unable to use the device, whether I-phone, computer, I-pad, Blackberry, etc., for any length of time, and you become irritable, tense, anxious, depressed, or angry-these are recognizable signs that should be considered as withdrawal symptoms. *Thirdly*, if you are driven to constantly upgrade to a bigger and faster unit, with more variety, apps, memory, etc., this should be a warning sign. The more stimulating the software and games become, you can be assured more time will be spent online. And finally, if you are beginning to notice an increase in arguments, lying, reduced achievement, social isolation, headaches, or fatigue-all of this can be an indication that IAD is a legitimate incremental possibility in your life. However, what is most serious about IAD is what it can do to your pleasure receptors. Like most addictions, because IAD has a similar effect on your "pleasure system" as do





and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders. Already, three major categories have been determined: 1) sexual preoccupations; 2) excessive gaming; and 3) Email/text messaging. Obviously, those involved with these activities can waste enormous amounts of time online, spending away precious moments from their real lives and those who matter



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other substances, sometimes an increase in pleasure loss is experienced known as "anhedonia"-in the little nuances of our lives. If one's digital device use is permitted to go on unchecked, and an addictive, excessive habit develops for any length of time, it *may lead* to depression problems. Dr. Archibald Hart has written a very good book on this subject titled, Thrilled to Death: How the Endless Pursuit of Pleasure is Leaving us Numb.

The words of Jesus Christ, our Lord, come with a very contemporary and strong warning about how the "love of many will wax cold" in the last days. As Christians, it is important we balance our lives against all the potential distractions that come in the form of a multitude of contraptions-and the world of digital devices is certainly a major trap if we allow it. Clearly, the almost cult-like following Apple has with its products is a testament to the potentially addictive world cyberspace has to offer.

A Balanced Life is the Christian Lifestyle

Some time ago, my wife and I went to a small local tavern for dinner and drinks. It's a quaint little pub type of establishment where a lot of the locals go who live in our rural township in Ohio. Upon arriving, we decided to eat at the bar and proceeded to seat ourselves at one of the far ends. I happened to notice that only two others were sitting beside us there. Additionally, I noticed both were using their I-phones for whatever purpose, and were not talking to each other, even though they were a couple.

After some time, the place began to fill up, especially around the bar. I happened to break from the conversation with my wife to notice what I thought was rather extraordinary. There was very little talking-I suppose that's what caught my attention and interrupted my conversation, now that I look back on it. To my surprise, it seemed most everyone was on his or her I-phones! Those who weren't, sat quietly while the others attended to their business or interests. They were all together, sitting next to each other, but no one was talking-many were busy, engrossed with their digital devices, texting, reading, or answering email, while others sat patiently waiting for their partner to finish up with the call, text, or email review! I found this

fascinating and quite illustrative of the day and age we're living in.

Since this experience, I can't help but notice how many people simply entertain and/or occupy themselves with virtual reality devices instead of spending quality real time with those they love. I'm sure you've noticed, when in public, people checking their email, texting, or answering a call while they're supposed to be engaged in the audience of the person they're with. Humorously, I've heard it said, the primary reason there was a baby-



cares, opportunities, and demands upon us in this world. Therefore, we must discipline ourselves in the use of our time by prioritizing our life's circumstances and obligations. All I'm suggesting is, the priority we place on the time we have with those we

Like it or not, we have



care most about, should be shown in *actuality* in the *real* world rather than sacrificing that time with the virtual world. This is what Christ would expect! It's only right, if we really do care for those in our lives.

Now don't get me wrong-surfing the web, texting, reading and writing emails, Tweeting and Facebook, managing your site, etc., is not evil in itself, any more than drinking alcohol is, or missing a Sabbath service or holyday service on occasion. But if it's going to become a major priority and/or habit in your life to over drink, miss Sabbath services, skip out on the holydays, or spend an extraordinary amount of time in the virtual world at the expense and sacrifice of our real life's needs, that's when it crosses over and becomes wrong. That is a misappropriated priority.

If we are allowing these technologies to preempt and encroach on our time spent with God and family-that is when these digital devices can become a lethal distraction that can lead to damaging, or outright destroying the relationships that mean so much to us-including our relationship with God. It would be an interesting comparison and assessment to honestly evaluate our time spent with television and other virtual reality technologies with that of our Bible Study and family time. Ponder that for a moment and be brutally honest with yourself.

Maintaining a balance, control, and discipline with these easy-access digital mechanisms is fast becoming a real challenge for many individuals who own these devices. Far too many of us are allowing them to infringe upon our personal living habits, consequently becoming a new habit that

negatively impacts our lives.

If not controlled, they are capable of destroying your relationships, "messing with your mind," and possibly changing your personality, causing you to be an "inattentive surf." This is fast becoming a proven fact by the psychological counseling community, according to growing statistics. The emotional connection to those around us-our husbands, wives, children, grandparents, sisters, brothers, friends, co-workers, etc.—can be at risk if we're not careful with the time we spend in virtual reality, compared to

boom generation during the 1950s was because there were no televisions in the bedroom. As comical as that may sound, let me remind you, we not only have television, but a prodigious amount of digital device distractions in the bedroom today that compete with our time for intimacy. And let me remind you, at least for some ethnicities, our reproduction rate isn't even high enough to stay even!

I say this in jest, of course, but the point is made rather plainly. We are surrounded by many distractions that compete for our time spent in the real and actual world with those we love-and if we're not careful, controlled, and actively managing the time we spend on these devices, the additional distractions and temptations that come with the virtual world will rob us of what little time we have left for our *real* world relationships. That's the point!

We are told in Daniel, in the last days, "many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased" (Daniel 12:4). This describes a very busy time that would demand a great deal of our attention-much like today. Living a balanced life between the material and secular obligations we find ourselves living with, and that of the spiritual and emotional demands a Christian lifestyle requires, isn't an easy task. Yet, our Lord in His prayer, prior to His crucifixion, appealed to the Father; "...not that thou shouldest take them [Christians] out of the world, but that thou shouldest keep them [Christians] from the evil. They [Christians] are not of the world, even as I am not of the world" (John 17:15-16).

actual reality.

So, manage and/or budget the time you spend in the cyber world. Don't let your digital contraptions control, use, and abuse you-instead, you remain in control and use it for the perceived benefits you believe will serve you well! Remember, you bought and paid for this technology-you own it—it doesn't own you! Ω



Our Lord's expectation of us is that we will be careful and cautious about the evil that stalks us. Maintaining vigilance about our habits, behaviors, and how we care about others is paramount to our Christian character and way of life. Notice, in the Parable of the Sower (Mark 4:19, Luke 8:14), how Jesus makes it clear that the cares of this world and the deceitfulness of riches and lusts of other things, can and will choke off the growth of His Word, preventing any fruit of conversion from us, if we don't control these cares and their effects in our lives.

Another Proverb states, "He that answereth a matter before he heareth it, it is folly and shame unto him" (Proverbs 18:13). We need to examine these facts with open minds, searching out the truth, not with minds clouded with emotion and tradition.

The plain truth is that NOWHERE in the Bible are believers in the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob or of Jesus Christ instructed to celebrate Christmas. You may search your Bible from cover to cover only to find that it just isn't there. Upon close examination, you will find that the early Christian church not only did *not* celebrate Christmas, but instead, God's people kept the sacred festivals God ordained in the Bible as outlined in Leviticus chapter 23. What the Experts Say

Consider these amazing facts from historians and reliable sources:

"Christmas was not among the earliest festivals of the church... the first evidence of the feast is from Egypt" (*Catholic Encyclopaedia*, 1911 Edition).

The 25th of December was celebrated in ancient days as the birthday of the unconquerable SUN god (variously know as *Tammuz*, *Mithra*, *Saturn*, *Adonis* or BAAL) centuries *before* Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem.

"Christmas customs are an evolution from times that long antedated the Christmas period—a descent from seasonal, pagan, religious and national practices, hedged about with legend and tradition... In the beginning many of the earth's inhabitants were sun worshippers because the course of their lives depended on its yearly round in the heavens, and feasts were held at its return from distant wanderings. In the south of Europe, in Egypt and Persia the sun-gods were worshipped with elaborate ceremonies at the season of the winter solstice, as a fitting time to pay tribute to the god of plenty, while in Rome the Saturnalia reigned for a week... The exact day and year of Christ's birth has never been satisfactorily settled. The fathers of the church in A.D. 340 chose the day of the *winter solstice* which was firmly fixed in the minds of the people and which was their most important festival" (*Encyclopaedia Britannica*, 1949, Article "Christmas," p. 642).

"In a famous letter to Augustine, Pope Gregory directs the great missionary to accommodate the ceremonies of the Christian worship as much as possible to those of the heathen, that the people might not be startled at the change, and in particular the Pope advised Augustine to allow converts to kill and eat at the Christmas festival a great number of oxen to the glory of God, *as they had formerly done to the Devil*" (*The Story of Christmas* by Michael Harrison, p. 28).

"It is nevertheless almost certain that the 25th of December cannot be the nativity of the Savior, for it is then the height of the rainy season in Judaea, and shepherds could hardly be watching their flocks by night in the plains.... Not casually or arbitrarily was the festival of the nativity celebrated on the 25th of December. One of the principal causes that co-operated in fixing this period was that almost all the heathen nations regarded the winter solstice as the turning point of the year-the beginning of the renewed life and activity of the powers of nature, and of the gods who were merely the symbolic personifications of these. In more northern countries this fact must have made itself peculiarly palpable-hence the Celts and Germans, from the oldest times, celebrated the season with the greatest festivities. At the winter solstice the Norsemen held their great Yule-feast in commemoration of the fiery sun-wheel, and believed that during the twelve nights from the 25th of December to the 6th of January they could trace the personal movements and interferences on earth of their great deities, Odin, Beretha, etc. Many of the beliefs and usages of the old Germans, and also of the Romans, relating to this period, passed over from heathenism to Christianity, and have partly survived to the present day" (Chambers Encyclopaedia, 1908 Edition, Vol. 11, p, 222, Article "Christmas").

"There is no authoritative tradition as to the day or month of Christ's birth.... The winter solstice was regarded as the birthday of the sun and at Rome a pagan festival of the nativity of 'sol invictus' was introduced by the Emperor Aurelian on the 25th of December, 274. The church, unable to stamp out this popular festival, spiritualized it as the feast of the Nativity of the Sun of Righteousness. When Christianity spread northwards it encountered a similar pagan festival also held at the winter solstice—the great Yule feast of the Norsemen. Once again Christmas absorbed heathen customs. From the various sources came the Yule log, the Christmas tree introduced into England from Germany and first mentioned in 1789" (*Chambers Encyclopaedia*, 1970, p. 538, Article "Christmas").

What, then, does God think of this pagan honor bestowed upon Him? "Thus saith the LORD, Learn not the way of the heathen, and be not dismayed at the signs of heaven; for the heathen are dismayed at them" (Jeremiah 10:2). He then goes on to mention one such custom. "For the customs of the people are vain: for one cutteth a tree out of the forest, the work of the hands of the workman, with the axe. They deck it with silver and with gold; they fasten it with nails and with hammers, that it move not" (Jeremiah 10:3). Do you know of any such custom today (verses 3-4)? Again, in Deuteronomy 12:30–32 God warns, "Take heed

to thyself that thou be not snared by following them, after that they be destroyed from before thee; and that thou enquire *not* after their gods, saying, 'How did these nations serve their gods? even so will I do likewise.' Thou shalt not do so unto the LORD thy God: for every abomination to the LORD, which he *hateth*, have they done unto their gods; for even their sons and their daughters they have burnt in the fire to their gods. What thing soever I command you, observe to do it: *thou shalt not add thereto, nor diminish from it.*'' As shocking as it may seem to most, there in your very own Bible God says He *hates* those pagan customs that are attributed to Him! More Authoritative Quotations

Now that we understand our Savior was not born on December 25, but in the autumn of the year, perhaps on the Feast of Trumpets or during the *Feast of Tabernacles*, let us consider further what various historians say about how December 25 came to be celebrated as the Savior's birth.

In the *Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire*, the author Gibbon says: "The Roman Christians, ignorant of his (Christ's) birth, fixed the solemn festival to the 25th of December, the Brumalia, or Winter Solstice, when the Pagans annually celebrated the birth of Sol" (Vol. ii, p. 383).

Grolier's Encyclopedia says: "Christmas is the feast of the birth of Jesus Christ, celebrated on December 25.... Despite the beliefs about Christ that the birth stories expressed, the church did *not* observe a festival for the celebration of the event until the *4th century*... since 274, under the emperor Aurelian, Rome had celebrated the feast of the '*Invincible Sun*' on December 25. In the Eastern Church, *January* 6, a day also associated with the winter solstice, was in Italy preferred. In course of time, however, the West added the Eastern date as the *Feast of the Epiphany*, and the East added the Western date of *Christmas*".

"The festivals of Rome are innumerable; but five of the most important may be singled out for elucidation—viz., Christmas-day, Lady-day, Easter, the Nativity of St. John, and the Feast of the Assumption. Each and all of these can be proved to be Babylonian" (*The Two Babylons* by Alexander Hislop, p. 91).

"Within the Christian Church no such festival as Christmas was ever heard of till the third century, and that not till the fourth century was far advanced did it gain much observance. How, then, did the Roman Church fix on December 25th as Christmas-day? Why, thus: Long before the fourth century, and long before the Christian era itself, a festival was celebrated among the heathen, at that precise time of the year, in honor of the birth of the son of the Babylonian queen of heaven; and it may fairly be presumed that in order to conciliate the heathen, and to swell the number of the nominal adherents of Christianity, the same festival was adopted by the Roman Church, giving it only the name of Christ. This tendency on the part of the Christians to meet Paganism half-way was very early developed ... Upright men strove to stem the tide, but in spite of all their efforts, the apostasy went on, till the Church, with the exception of a small remnant, was submerged under Pagan superstition. That Christmas was originally a Pagan festival is beyond all doubt. The time of the year, the ceremonies with which it is still celebrated prove its origin. In Egypt, the son of Isis, the Egyptian title for the queen of heaven, was born at this very time, 'about the time of the winter solstice'" (Ibid., p. 93).

As you can see, there is no shortage of historical evidence that Christmas long antedated Christ. Scholars have known these facts for centuries. They can be easily confirmed in any reference library. In short, we see that each year on December 25 the ancient pagans held a festival in honor of the SUN god. In order to win Gentile converts to the Christian faith, the Roman Church, centuries after the times of the apostles, *adopted* this ancient pagan winter festival of the *SUN* god and renamed it the "Mass of Christ"—or in its shortened form, "Christmas"—mistakenly thinking that the play upon words would shift the honor to the *SON of God*, the Savior of the world.

"Even where the sun was the favorite object of worship, as in Babylon itself and elsewhere, at this festival he was worshipped not merely as the orb of day, but *as God incarnate*. It was an essential principle of the Babylonian system, that the *Sun or Baal was the one only God. When, therefore Tammuz was worshipped as God incarnate, that implied also that he was an incarnation of the Sun.* In the Hindoo mythology, which is admitted to be essentially *Continued on next page*

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Babylonian, this comes out very distinctly. There, Surya, or the Sun, is represented as being incarnate, and born for the purpose of subduing the enemies of the gods, who, without such a birth, could not have been subdued.

"It was no mere astronomical festival, then, that the Pagans celebrated at the winter solstice. That festival at Rome was called the *feast of Saturn*, and the mode in which it was celebrated there, showed whence it had been derived. The feast as regulated by Caligula, lasted five days; loose reins were given to drunkenness and revelry, slaves had temporary emancipation and used all manner of freedoms with their masters. This was precisely the way in which, according to Berosus, the drunken festival of the month Thebeth, answering to our December, in other words, the *festival of Bacchus*, was celebrated in Babylon... *The Christmas tree*, now so common among us, was equally common in pagan Rome and pagan Egypt. In Egypt that tree was the palm-tree; in Rome it was the fir; the palm tree denoting the pagan Messiah, as *Baal-Tamar*, the fir referring to him as *Baal-Berith*" (Ibid., p. 96–97).

So How Did Christmas Get Into the Christian Church?

The *New Schaff-Herzog Encyclopedia of Religious Knowledge* gives a clear explanation in the article on "Christmas":

"How much the date of the festival depended upon the pagan Brumalia [December 25] following the Saturnalia [December 17–24], and celebrating the shortest day of the year and the 'new sun'...cannot be accurately determined. The pagan Saturnalia and Brumalia were too deeply entrenched in popular custom to be set aside by Christian influence.... The pagan festival with its riot and merrymaking was so popular that Christians were glad of an excuse to continue its celebration with little change in spirit and in manner. Christian preachers of the West and the Near East protested against the unseemly frivolity with which Christ's birthday was celebrated, while Christians of Mesopotamia accused their western brethren of idolatry and sun worship for adopting as Christian this pagan festival" (emphasis added).

The Roman Empire had been totally pagan, and prior to the fourth century, Christians were few in numbers and persecuted by both the government and pagans. Then the Emperor Constantine professed Christianity, placing it on an equal footing with paganism. Christianity suddenly became popular.

However most of the "converts" had been brought up in pagan customs, the chief of which was December 25. They enjoyed this festival of joy and merrymaking, and they did not want to give it up!

The pagan Manichaeism identified the SON of God with the physical SUN, giving the new "converts" an excuse to call December 25 (re-birth of the SUN) the birthday of the SON of God.

According to the *Encyclopedia Britannica*, some Latins, as early as AD 354, may have transferred the birthday of Christ from January 6 to December 25, which was then a Mithraic feast or birthday of the unconquered SUN. The Syrians and Armenians who clung to January 6 accused the Romans of sun worship and idolatry, claiming the December 25 festival was invented by the disciples of Cerinthus.

Many "gods," Same Birthday

Upon examination, we find there were many others who celebrated the 25th of December as the birthday of *their* gods before it was agreed upon as the birthday of Jesus. There are the people of India, who rejoice, decorate their houses with garlands, and give presents to their friends on this day.



The people of China also celebrate this day and close their shops. The pagan god Buddha is believed to have been born on this day when the "Holy Ghost" descended on his virgin mother Maya.

The great savior and

virgin," was believed to have been born on the 25th of December.

The Greeks celebrated the 25th of December as the birthday of Hercules, the son of the supreme god of the Greeks, Zeus, through the mortal woman Alcmene. Bacchus, the god of wine and revelry among the Romans (known among the Greeks as Dionysus), was also born on this day.

Adonis, revered as a "dying-and-rising god" among the Greeks, miraculously was also born on the 25th of December. His worshipers held him a yearly festival representing his death and resurrection in midsummer. The ceremonies of his birthday are recorded d to have taken place in the



same cave in Bethlehem which is claimed to have been the birth place of Jesus.

The Scandinavians celebrated the 25th of December as the birthday of their god Freyr, the son of their supreme god of the heavens, Odin.

The Romans observed this day as the birthday of the *god of the SUN*, *Natalis Solis Invicti* ("Birthday of Sol the Invincible"). There was great rejoicing, and all shops were closed while the people turned to fun and games. Presents were exchanged, and slaves were indulged in great liberties. Remember, these are the same Romans who would later preside over the council of Nicea (AD 325), which led to the official Christian recognition of the "Trinity" as the "true" nature of God, and the "fact" that Jesus was born on the 25th of December also.

Christmas is not the only "Christian" festival that was borrowed from ancient paganism and foisted upon the religion of Jesus. There is also the venerable day of the Sun (SuN-day), Easter, the Feast of St. John, the Holy Communion, the Annunciation of the Virgin, the Assumption of the Virgin, and many others. These all have their roots in ancient pagan worship, and have crept into professing Christianity today.

Okay! So Christmas is a pagan festival! But what if we just honor Christ and don't take part in any of these pagan customs?

Let us allow the Scriptures speak for themselves...

The Scripture declares, "God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit *and in truth*" (John 4:24). "We are of God: he that knoweth God heareth us; he that is not of God heareth not us. Hereby know we the spirit of truth, and the spirit of error" (1 John 4:6). God's spirit is the spirit of truth (John 17:17) and the spirit of truth does not lead us to the truth through error, half-truths, lies, or false doctrine. Truth slices through and exposes falsehood *every time*. "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Hebrews 4:12).

Consider: Worshipping Christ through honoring His birthday on a day that is *NOT* His birthday, borrowing many pagan customs in the process, is *NOT* worshipping Him "in Spirit and in Truth!" On the contrary, it is actually taking His name in vain. "Howbeit *in vain* do they *worship* me," Christ said, "teaching for doctrines the commandments of *men*" (Mark 7:7). God is supreme. It is *HE* who determines when and how He will be worshipped, not puny, sinful little men.

What Now?

If this information is new to you, your head may be spinning. You may be wondering, "How does this information affect me? What shall I do?" Perhaps you now find yourself in an impasse. If all this about Christmas is correct, then how should we respond? To ignore truth is obviously not a safe policy to follow, especially when it concerns the choice between Baal worship on the one hand and obedience to the commandments of God on the other. If you are intellectually honest, we challenge you to go to the library and check it out. Read as many encyclopedias, dictionaries, and other reference works as you can to see if these things are true. The Bible commands us to "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21). The inference is, if it is not good and true, do not hold fast to it; let it go. We prove all things by comparing what we hear with the Word of God, and if our beliefs and customs—however cherished they may be—do not agree with the Bible, we need to reject them. If they do agree with the Bible, receive, believe, and practice them. God does not require "blind faith." Hearers of the Gospel are bound to inquire, examine, and judge whether what they hear is-or is not-according to Scripture. Any man or body of men who denies us this right, or hinders us from exercising it, is violating the revealed will of God.

Woodcuts from *The Two Babylons* showing the mother-and-child tradition from various cultures god of the Persians, Mithras, is also believed to have been born on the 25th of December long *before* the coming of Jesus.

The Egyptians celebrated this day as the birthday of their great savior Horus, the Egyptian god of light and the son of the "virgin mother" and "queen of the heavens," Isis. Osiris, lord of the dead and the underworld in Egypt, the son of "the holy

When you have thoroughly studied the matter, you are left with a choice: We can either go along with the pagan festival of Christmas *or* obey the Almighty's commandments.

There really is no other option.

wresting Scripture (2 Peter 3:16), tradition (Mark 7:9), worldly philosophy (Colossians 2:9), and human reasoning (Mark 2:6). *They traded:*

- Sunday for Sabbath
- Easter for Passover
- The world's pagan holidays for God's holydays
- Tradition for sound doctrine

If followers did not accept the new changes, they were labeled "old school," "unenlightened," "rebellious," and—horror of horrors!—"legalists!" How ironic! Should we not *want* to be legal with God, and not illegal?

And if one did not go along with their "new truth" paradigm, a spirit of division arose. Many felt as though they were left alone, abandoned, ostracized from old friends and family. The sheep instinct intimidated many into going along—compromising—with the biblical truth they once studied, proved, knew, and believed!

The result was a splintering, no, a *shattering*, of that organization into literally hundreds of quarreling splits and divisions. One of Satan's favorite tactics is "Divide and conquer." Satan will come with a boatload of accusations, "alternate understandings," and "new truth." Beware of anyone who says, "The Bible doesn't really mean that," as they try to shoehorn in their own interpretations. Don't tell me what it "means"—tell me what it SAYS and I'll *know* what it means!

The world—and false churches—will always attack the old-fashioned Bible believer—the Scripturalist—who takes a stand for the Bible and Jesus Christ no matter what! "Wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them to the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you" (1 Peter 4:4).

"No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon" (Matthew 6:24).

To compromise the truth of God's Word means to arbitrate with the devil and concede that he is partly in the right. A case in point: Adam and Eve in the Garden. Nothing will blind the eyes of a man or woman quicker than a touch of compromise. The old life of sin does not look so bad when viewed through the eyeglasses of compromise. COMPROMISE IS A CHRIS-TIAN'S DEADLIEST ENEMY! Remember the story of the frog that was placed in a pan of cool water. As the water was slowly heated, the frog felt good—until he was *too weak* to jump out, and perished. The world's paganized holidays are just around the corner. Will you be pressured to compromise—to give in "just a little" so you don't offend anyone—or will we be strong and of good courage and take a stand for God's truth? Think about it.

Romans. 12:2 warns, "And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

"And I heard another voice from heaven, saying, 'Come out of her, My people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues" (Revelation 18:4).

The scripture comes to mind, "Thou shalt make no covenant [agreement] with them, nor with their gods" (Exodus 23:32) No compromise! A great rule of thumb is: When in doubt, don't!

It is good to be cooperative—when you can—but to sell your value system for riches, favor, position, or advancement is a greased slide back into the world! A Christian who tries to satisfy everyone ends up not pleasing anyone.

Spiritual Immunization

How do we immunize ourselves from the sin of compromise? You already know. It's found in Ephesians 6:13: "Wherefore take unto you the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand." Too many only put on *part* of the armor of God and are therefore not fit for full spiritual battle. Remember, Satan is in the process of deceiving the whole world (Revelation 12:9), and he is out to get YOU personally (1 Peter 5:8). "For we wrestle *not* against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places" (Ephesians 6:12). We are no match for him. To go to battle with Satan and his minions without God's Spirit is like going to battle in your underwear and a plastic sword. "*Thou* [God] art my hiding place and my shield: I hope in Thy Word" (Psalms 119:114).

"Wherefore I put thee in remembrance that thou *stir up the gift of God*, which is in thee by the putting on of my hands" (2 Timothy 1:6).

2 Corinthians 4:16 says, "For which cause we faint not; but though our outward man perish, yet *the inward man is renewed day by day*."

When the Holy Spirit dwindles in a person, truth and the ability to resist error is LOST with it! We must go to God in daily prayer and ask Him to renew His Holy Spirit in us. We are told in 1 Thessalonians 5:19, "Quench not the Spirit." There are at least two ways to quench or put out the Holy Spirit. We can deliberately reject Jesus Christ by saying, in effect, "That's it! I no longer accept You as my Lord and Savior. I want to live my life my way!" Or, more quietly, we can simply let it starve to death by inattention, lack of prayer, Bible study, and meditation.

"Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust. And beside this, giving all diligence, ADD to your faith *virtue*; and to virtue *knowledge*; And to knowledge *temperance*; and to temperance *patience*; and to patience *godliness*; And to godliness *brotherly kindness*; and to brotherly kindness *charity*. For if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But he that lacketh these things is blind, and cannot see afar off, and hath forgotten that he was purged from his old sins. Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure: for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall" (2 Peter 1:4–10) Ω

to understand our mind and its operation could cause us to vote against our professed priorities. Drawing on both the Bible and leading edge thinking on the brain, Mr. O'Connor showed how our unconscious prejudices, such as "confirmation bias" and "selection bias" can influence us in ways we might be completely unaware of. Deacon Derrick Alwood delivered what for many was the message of the Feast, titled How to Avoid Spiritual Burnout. His brilliant use of metaphors and stories weaved a compelling tapestry of spiritual enlightenment. "Your problems are for a purpose," he said. "Always remember that the same sun which melts wax also hardens clay; you decide which you will be." He asserted that the problem of spiritual burnout can only be solved by understanding that our problems are taking us somewhere where God wants us to be. Sermonette speaker Sean Goldburn also delivered a memorable presentation titled *Developing* Spiritual Habits. Like Deacon O'Connor, he drew from Scripture, scientific research, and practical experience to emphasize the power of habits in shaping our lives. He explained how habits are structured and how to take control of the habit loop consisting of cue-routine-reward, by nurturing strong desire to change and grow.

All the other sermons and sermonettes were of very high quality and lelivered valuable insights and practical instruction for overcoming. Eliud Ramocan delivered an engaging multimedia presentation titled Resurrection Time and the Millennium Mind. Deacon Fenton Tracy delivered a much talked about sermonette on Developing Unity in the Church. As the Jamaican work continues to grow, it is essential for all the groups to work together in Christian love and harmony in order to be as effective as possible. Other speakers included Ricardo Hall, Stephen Scale, Jeremy McKenzie, Jordan McKenzie, and Toronto pastor George Ramocan, who closed off the Feast with two practical sermons on how to overcome in the Christian walk. This year, the special Herbert W. Armstrong Memorial Speaking Competition was wrested from Kingston by an outstanding new presenter from Spanish Town, Mr. Allen. On the Last Great Day, Pastor Boyne and Deacon O'Connor baptized 13 new members into the church. This was the highest number of people ever baptized at the Feast of Tabernacles. he Jamaican CGI continued its record-breaking output at this year's Feast of Tabernacles, chalking up an high attendance of 416 and a baptism of 13 persons at its Feast site in Ocho Rios, St. Ann. This year marks the 30th anniversary of the Church of God International in Jamaica, and the 40th anniversary of Pastor Boyne's call to the Church of God. In 1982, the CGI began in his living room with five persons, including himself and his wife. The contrast between that image and the sight of a packed auditorium at the Ruins at the Falls, with over 400 jubilant Feast-

keepers from four congregations, couldn't have been more telling. (The numbers are more impressive in light of the fact that the church lost a third of its membership in a 1997 split.) Veteran Feast-keepers and newbies alike from Kingston, Spanish Town, Ocho Rios, and Maroon Town started off the Feast on a high with an exciting session of special Bible readings, hymns, and praise and worship. All the brethren paid a special tribute to Pastor Boyne in honour of his 40th anniversary in the Church of God and for his role establishing the CGI here. In his brief greetings on the opening night, Mr. Boyne shared a few reflections on his journey and thanked God for sustaining him. He also commended all who continued to support the work which God had blessed from such humble beginnings. From the opening night, the brethren were in a festive mood, which carried over into the first day, conducted by the vibrant and creative worship leader Deacon Chris Hendricks. Special items of songs and dance were given by Aldith Smith, Janielle Smith, Tahlee Lee, the Group Promise, Kerrian Brissett, Paul O'Connor, Donnovan Hylton, Delroy Parks, Cynthia Reynolds, Kelly-Ann Boyne, Trever Wright, Rene Miur, saxophonist Don Croswell, Kimari Bell, Kaydene Wright, and the CGI Adult Choir led by Mr. Brian Scott. Throughout the festival, these performers enriched the brethren with inspiring and uplifting performances.

For the first time ever, Mr. Boyne did not deliver the opening sermon at the Feast, and in fact, didn't speak until the fourth day. Ministerial Apprenticeship Programme (MAP) candidate Pedro Hall, leader of the Spanish Town congregation, enjoyed the honour of giving the opening sermon of the Feast, a memorable sermon titled Wanted: True Worshippers. Noting that human beings have a particular penchant for self-deception, Mr. Hall stated that, as Christians, we needed to be careful that we don't fall into the category of false worshippers. Using the story of Jesus' encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well, in John 4:21-24, Mr. Hall showed that true worshippers worship God both in spirit and in truth. He pointed out the fascinating incongruity of an adulterous woman on her sixth extramarital affair, whose pressing concern was the right place of worship. "She failed to realize that her focus was on the wrong priority. She didn't realize that being a true worshipper had more to do with how she lived rather than where she worshipped," he said. He cautioned listeners not to make the same mistake.

Pastor Roger King from the United States, who was keeping his 48th Feast, delivered the sermon in the second service on the first day. He expressed his pleasure at returning to the Jamaican Feast site after having done so several years ago. Sharing his increasing love and appreciation for nature, Mr. King explained how the Feast days showed the process through which God was going to put things back in order and usher in his Kingdom. He also gave another sermon titled The Mirror of Nature, in which he showed the importance of understanding what went wrong with God's creation which made the future restoration described in Isaiah 2 and Isaiah 11 necessary.

In my second-day sermon, I focused on *The Power of Decision* to shape our physical and eternal destinies. Pastor Boyne's much anticipated fourth day sermon and his fifth day follow-up were both captivating doctrinal and scholarly expositions on the book of Revelation. Commenting on Mr. Hall's sermon, he stated that, at the heart of the book, was the issue of true worshippers versus false worshippers, and that the Last Days would be a



Osoyoos, British Columbia, CANADA

The Feast of Tabernacles 2012 found us at the Spirit Ridge Vineyard Resort and Spa in Osoyoos, BC. It's a day's drive from our home on Vancouver Island, and when we began to see those brown, dusty mountains sparsely populated with scraggly trees, to be honest I wrinkled my nose a little bit. They are very different from the Rockies, which are green and majestic and snow-capped. So different and desolate these mountains were, and I didn't like them at first. Then, when we reached the town of Osoyoos, and saw the sun glittering off Lake Osoyoos, and the orchards and vineyards stretching away for miles through Canada's only desert (that before I didn't even know we *had*), green and lush and full of life in a land of tumbleweeds and rattlesnakes, I began to see the beauty of the place. It's rugged and unassuming and just a little dangerous.

Here at the southern-most tip of the Okanagan, where the Great Basin Desert ends, the Osoyoos Indian band call it "NK'MIP" (pronounced *in-ka-meep*), which means "bottomland," and is the name of the Cultural Centre, Conference Centre, wine cellars, and RV Park that make up this cultural and experiential destination. Other amenities included the Sonora Dunes Golf Course and the Mica Restaurant and Solstice Spa. Although the restaurant and spa were in a different building from our accommodations and required just a little bit of a walk, the weather was so gorgeous that I never minded walking it.

It was very different for me, having only ever been to a Feast site where the hotel is within walking distance of the bustling downtown of a big city, to be there in the middle of a very small town (it doesn't even have a movie theatre!) It was just a little too far to walk into the town proper from the resort (especially with the threat of rattlesnakes if you stray too far off the path), so for the most part we stayed on the grounds of Spirit Ridge. Mica Restaurant has a beautiful patio overlooking the pool, and the food was wonderful. They use fresh-caught fish and fruit from the nearby orchards, and were very patient with the smallest, messiest members of the congregation.

We were very blessed this year to have a variety of speakers, including Vance Stinson, who came all the way from Texas to be with us. He spoke to us about delayed intervals in prophecy; how John presents an "expanded" version of the Olivet prophecy found in Matthew, Mark and Luke; and the eighth day as a confirmation of God's universal salvific will. Rick Dubler reminded us that it takes time and effort to prepare a tool for its purpose and to appreciate the gift of hope that we have as Christians. Adam Dubler challenged us to see ourselves as the helpless traveler in need of the Good Samaritan (Christ). John Coish informed us that evil dehumanizes its enemies, but good can win those in doubt, and discussed Satan's final deception. Doug Coish explored some "little white sins" and their consequences. Darren Connery appealed to us to build one another up—becoming a sanctuary together. We were also treated to a play performed by John Coish and the youth called *Heroes of the Bible or So Great a Cloud of Witnesses*.

Special music was as uplifting as ever, and included more talent than we are used to seeing in Nanaimo. Thai, Tia, and Angela Jantzen and Shane Pye graced us with their beautiful voices, and Pansy Alcorn and Jean Schellenburg accompanied the hymns on piano, which was a real treat, let me tell you. It was lovely to have so many people using their incredible gift of music to contribute to our worship.

The activities were well attended, as usual. We started with a Games Night on Monday, followed by go-carting and mini-golf at Rattlesnake Canyon. Wednesday was a delicious and very fancy luncheon on the patio of the winery, on a cliff overlooking the vineyards and lake, followed by a tour of the on-site NK'MIP Winery, where we learned how they made their signature wines and got to taste a few. That evening there was a rooftop BBQ (sunset over the mountains-stunning!) and a movie in the theatre room of the Conference Centre. The next afternoon, many of us went on a trail ride on horseback to a delicious meal on the lake at Rattlesnake Point and back. It was an hour and a half there and an hour and a half back, and by the end of it I think most of us were pretty sore, but boy was it worth it. Weaving through the sagebrush and wading through the lake on our horses was an exhilarating experience. Because the weather was sunny and beautiful, we were able to have an afternoon on the lake, with canoes and kayaks available down at the marina. Saturday night there was a Variety Show and Karaoke, and more board and card games played until quite late in the evening. There was poetry recited by young Jackson Dubler, music by Nicole Poulson, Thai, Jenny, and Amy Jantzen, and a psychological thriller recounted by Shane Pye. Mr. Darren Connery hosted the event. Sunday afternoon we had some free time after church, and then there was Bowling and Beach Volleyball.

All in all, I think this particular Feast site was a smashing success. Everyone I talked to had a wonderful time, and had a very encouraging, uplifting, and pampered week. I hope we get the opportunity to worship and fellowship there again together in the future. Ω



Church News

Prophecy 2012 Conference

n the weekend of Saturday, November 10 through Sunday, November 11, the Church of God International Toronto held our "Prophecy 2012" Outreach Conference. Organized by our evangelism ministry, led by Sister Beatrix Tanakis and Deacon Horane Smith, the conference was a great success. Praise be to the Most High God!

On Day One, our total attendance was 142 persons, and 110 for Day Two. This included a total of 52 first time visitors who were all presented with CGI welcome kits.

Our three presenters, CGI Pastors Bill Watson, Vance Stinson, and George Ramocan, each delivered two Spirit-filled, thoughtprovoking messages dealing with the subject matter of prophecy.

The conference began with a video presentation by Mr. Watson entitled 2012: Is It the End? This was a perfect introduction that fittingly set the stage for our three Day One presentations. Our first presenter, Mr. George Ramocan, spoke on The Mystery of the Seven Seals. He gave the audience a much deeper insight into the perilous times ahead. He spoke about the seven seals not just representing God's wrath and punishment, but also signifying God's desire to bring mankind to repentance.

After our lunch break, all three of our presenters, joined by Pastor Murray Palmatier, conducted a very spirited, interactive open forum discussion. Church members and guests were given the opportunity to ask questions and get our pastors' biblical perspective on a wide range of topics. This was also repeated on Day Two, and to many, this was considered the highlight of their conference weekend.

As Day One of the conference took place on the Sabbath day, we commenced our afternoon session with songs of praise and worship to our Lord Jesus Christ.

Our afternoon presenters, Vance Stinson and Bill Watson, wrapped things up with messages on The Olivet Prophecy and The Rapture.

Mr. Stinson examined the claim that the prophesied "great tribulation" of Matthew 24 occurred in AD 70, when Roman armies besieged Jerusalem and destroyed the temple. Mr. Stinson, citing works by several Protestant scholars, pointed out that this view is gaining popularity in the Evangelical world.

He called the audience's attention to the context, pointing out that Jesus did indeed prophesy the events of AD 67-70, both the desolation of Jerusalem and the destruction of the temple. However, he explained, when the Olivet prophecy is understood in light of many other prophetic texts, it becomes very clear that the "tribulation" that befell Jerusalem in AD 70 serves as a type of a future event that will occur on a much wider scale.

Mr. Stinson expounded prophetic principles such as the "kaleidoscopic" and "apotelesmatic" principles, and cited Daniel 11 and other passages to illustrate the importance of these principles in interpreting prophetic texts like Matthew 24, Mark 13, and Luke 21.

Mr. Watson's presentation was designed to refute the alleged claim that the Bible speaks about a rapture for God's people. First Thessalonians 4:13–18 was used to illustrate the fact that nothing is said about going to heaven or a physical place of safety.

On Day Two, Mr. Stinson led off with a presentation entitled A Tale of Two Beasts. He gave the audience historical context into the "tale of two beasts," which began in the first century and will conclude with the second coming of Jesus Christ. The governmental-religious system represented by the two beasts (or "beast" and "false prophet") existed when Revelation was written, and has appeared at various times through the subsequent centuries. There will be a final manifestation of this murderous, blasphe mous system at the time of the end.

Mr. Watson concluded the prophecy conference with a message entitled So, Where Are We in Prophecy? This presentation was designed to illustrate that there are many things yet to occur. By using Daniel 11 and the invasion of the king of the north into the Middle East, pushing at the king of the south, he listed parts of the end-time puzzle that are definitely

identified as evidence of events to come. He spoke about the United States of America and how they will continue their decline and eventually lose their position of geopolitical influence that they've shared with Britain for some 300 to 500 years. But regardless of all potential future events, Mr. Watson encouraged the audience that at the end of the day, the most important thing

for us to focus on is getting our lives right with God. One must repent and accept Jesus Christ as the Messiah and get baptized, beginning a lifelong journey of modeling the likeness of Jesus Christ (2 Peter 2:21).

That means you are never quite sure whether he is serious or joking. For instance, when Dale was presented his Certificate of Baptism, he remarked, "Now I have permission to get in."

Dale is survived by his wife, Karen, sons Harley and Casey, and daughter Michelle (husband, Douglas), his mother Julia, a brother Malcalm, and four grandchildren. Dale loved God, his family, and nature. The family had fun doing it all—riding their ATV, scuba diving, etc. But it wasn't until they began studying the Bible that they really started to enjoy life. A new sermon on CD or any printed material was soon listened to or read. They couldn't get enough.

Dale fought the good fight. Through it all, there were two constants: Dale and Karen only asked for prayers, and Dale always wore a smile. He was a true example of faith and courage.

Interesting Facts About the Bible

The Bible is universal and known around the world, but what makes it so different? The fact is, there has never been a book written like it ever before. The Bible is, in fact, written from actual human history. It claims to be the Word of God (2 Timothy 3:16) and His interactions with people and nations. The Bible is in reality a collection of books—some short and some longer. The authors were touched by the Holy Spirit to write the words (2 Peter 1:20–21). Here are some points to consider:

- The Bible was penned by over 40 authors from three continents—Asia, Africa, and Europe—written in different locations, including prisons, islands, while traveling—and at different times, covering 1,500 years, by shepherds, fishermen, kings, and diverse occupations—yet all in perfect harmony! These men wrote this Scripture as they were given inspiration by God (2 Timothy 3:16). Christ Himself declared, "The Scripture cannot be broken."
- The Bible is the largest seller of all books ever published.
- About 50 Bibles are sold in the United States every minute.
- The Bible is also the most shoplifted book in the world.
- The Old Testament was written in Hebrew, and the New Testament was written in Greek; but now the Bible is written in 6,000 different languages around the world!
- The first translation of the English Bible was initiated by John Wycliffe and completed by John Purvey in 1388.

- The Bible was divided into chapters by Stephen Langton in 1228. The Old Testament was divided into verses by R. Nathan in 1488, and the New Testament by Robert Stephanus in 1551.
- The entire Bible divided into chapters and verses first appeared in the Geneva Bible of 1560.
- The word "Christian" only appears three times in the Bible.
- The words "trinity," "rapture," and "immortal soul" are nowhere mentioned in the Bible.
- The Bible is actually made up of 773,692 words, and takes an average of 70 hours to read!
- The longest chapter in the Bible is Psalm 119, with 176 verses. The shortest chapter is Psalm 117, with only two verses.
- The longest book of the Bible is Psalms, with 150 chapters. It contains 43,743 words. The shortest book is 3 John, with only one chapter, containing 299 words.
- The longest verse in the Bible is Esther 8:9, with 90 words. The shortest verse is John 11:35, with only two words, "Jesus wept."
- There are more than 3,200 verses of fulfilled prophecy in the Bible. But there are still more than 3,100 verses with prophecies yet to be fulfilled.





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
