Basic Ideas to Help a Teacher Present a Sabbath School Lesson

The goal of each lesson is what you hope the students will learn by the end of the lesson.

The presentation should include how you prepare for the lesson and how you present it to your students. It is best, if working with young students or students with short attention spans, to be able to tell the story in an interesting way. And to present it on their level. Sometimes a felt board or white board comes in handy for this if you have students that need visual aids.

Memory verses can help reinforce the theme of the lesson. Keep it simple for younger student.

Scriptures should be used to back up the lesson.

The Sabbath school class should be an enjoyable place to be, Where the students can learn about the Bible and God's word in an interesting way and on their own level. A place that they will want to come back to every week.

The teacher must like the children and get to know each one of them as an individual. This is not always as easy as it sounds. But don't give up.

Give awards and recognition on a regular basis, without making them wait too long. Give the award in front of the congregation if possible and if the student isn't too shy. Don't embarrass the student.

Make them feel as if they are an important part of the church, because they are. They are the next generation of the church. Encourage them to develop friendships with other children in the church. Some of the ways this can be done is through group discussions, interactive games, field trips and so on.

For younger students or hard to control students, have a treasure box filled with small inexpensive items that the student can pick from if they are well behaved. This really does work.

Enjoy your class. You will learn even more than your students do.
