Jesus is Resurrected



John 18;19 Memory Verse

"And now, little children, abide in him; that, when he shall appear, we may have confidence, and not be ashamed before him at His coming"

Teacher's Objective

At the end of the session, the students should be able to:

- 1. Define the importance of Matthew 12:40 and how this is a sign and proof of the Messiahship of Christ
- 2. Locate on a map the areas
 Jesus visited during His
 forty days on earth
 - 3. Describe several important events that took place during the forty days Jesus walked the earth before ascending to heaven
- 4. Express in their own words the importance of the events that took place during these forty days



Teacher's Bible Study

Christ's resurrection from the dead was the focal point of universal history—an event of ultimate importance without equal in the unfolding of God's master plan. His burial for three days and three nights, and His subsequent resurrection, was the very sign and proof of His Messiahship (Matthew 12:40). His resurrection proved that man could also be resurrected; it showed the viability of God's plan and was the means by which human beings could eventually be resurrected to eternal life.

Upon repentance and baptism, we have the opportunity to take advantage of Christ's sacrifice to pay the penalty for our own personal sins. And through God's grace we can also receive the gift of eternal life. Jesus Christ's life, death and resurrection makes this possible.

Christ has now ascended and is exalted at the right hand of God the Father at the throne of heaven. He is once again actually God, all-powerful and shining in the spirit realm like the sun (Revelation 1:13–16), yet with the same mercy and compassion He exemplified during His physical life. Jesus is the firstfruit of salvation, the first mortal to be made immortal, the first human being to become a member of the God Family. He is the Christian's elder brother and the forerunner of our salvation, the consummate High Priest and Advocate, Intercessor and Mediator before God's throne of mercy.

Presenting the Bible Story

Matthew 28:2-4

Morning of the Resurrection

After the Sabbath, on the first day of the week, the angel of the Lord rolls away the stone from Jesus' tomb. The answer to how life after death can be proven is here. Jesus was "declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the spirit of holiness, by the *resurrection* from the dead" (Romans 1:4).

Mark 16:14; Luke 24:36–43 John 20:19– 25 The tomb of Jesus is visited by several women, whereupon they find Him missing. Remember that Pilate had put a special seal on the tomb. He also had a soldier standing guard. Pilate was concerned that the disciples would steal the body of Jesus and then claim that Jesus had risen from the dead. The two men spoken of here are angels.

Luke 24:9–12; John 20:2–10 When Peter and John learn that Jesus is no longer in the tomb, they rush to see for themselves. Peter and John still did not understand that "Jesus had to rise from the dead" (John 20:9). The mere fact that the clothes of Jesus were still in the tomb emphasized that His body had not been stolen.

Mark 16:5-7

Two angels appeared to the women who remained at the tomb of Jesus. The angels told them about the Resurrection.

Luke 24:4-8

Peter and John visit Jesus' tomb.

Luke 24:12

Mary was very sad that Jesus was not in the tomb. Jesus appears to Mary

John 20:3-10

Magdalene in the garden. Later, Jesus appears to the other women.

Mark 16:9-11 John 20:11-18

Jesus appears for the second time to Mary, mother of James, Salome, and Joanna.

Matthew 28:8-10

The guards who guarded the tomb of Jesus report to the religious rulers that they were bribed and that an angel rolled away the stone.

Matthew 28:11-15

Jesus' third appearance is with Peter.

I Corinthians 15:5

Afternoon After the Resurrection

Mark 16:12–13 Luke 24:13–32 Jesus appears to two men on the road to Emmaus. These two men were saddened by the death of Jesus. They felt a tragedy had occurred because they believed Jesus would set up a political kingdom during their time on earth.

Luke 24:33-35

Evening After the Resurrection

These two men on the road to Emmaus tell others that they saw Jesus. The two men tell others what Jesus said. His death was according to the plan of God. His death made the way for the salvation of mankind.

Mark 16:14; Luke 24:36–43; John 20:19– 25 Jesus appears to the 11 disciples. Jesus did not need to eat for nourishment. He did this as one more example or proof that He was real. Thomas is absent. When Thomas heard that Jesus had been there, he doubted. He did not believe.

A Week Later

John 20:26-31

Jesus once again appears to his disciples, and this time Thomas is there. Thomas wanted to see for himself the wounds of Jesus. After he did, he did believe that Jesus had risen from the dead.

The Following 32 Days

On the sea of Galilee Jesus appears to seven of the disciples. Jesus performs a miracle of fish. After the disciples had eaten, Jesus asked Peter if he loved Him.

On a mountain in Galilee, Jesus appears to 500 people. The signs that Jesus spoke of did take place. We read about them in Acts 5:12.

Jesus appears to his half brother, James.

While in Jerusalem, Jesus appears once again to His disciples. Jesus tells His disciples that His death and resurrection fulfilled Scripture. The Holy Spirit was announced by Joel in Joel 2:28,29.

While the disciples watch, Jesus ascends to heaven from the Mount of Olives. A "Sabbaths day's journey" may have been about 2/3 mile.

Young Children

Copy the "doorknob hanger" pattern on heavy colored paper. Or, fold construction paper in half and glue for added strength. Using same color paper that the heart was cut out of, or a a different color, write "Jesus Loves Me" and glue to bottom of hanger.

Their activity page is a maze. Provide crayons or colored markers so they can color the pictures on the maze.

Older Children

Make a tomb with a moveable rock displaying the words on the inside that say "The Lord has risen." Make copies of the tomb pattern on black construction paper. Make the stone pattern out of brown paper, and the open door out of white. Follow the directions on pattern.






Black, brown, white construction paper
