ivine healing is a miracle which God in His mercy and love may extend to those who call upon Him in time of need, according to faith and His will. Christians are encouraged to appreciate this special benefit from God as well as to do everything they can for themselves in times of illness or injury by seeking the most competent professional help. Faith in God for healing does not conflict with the use of modern medical science. We are to ask for our healing within God's will, ask God to lead and direct us, actively try to get well, and trust God for the outcome.

The healings of Jesus Christ demonstrate and represent His power to express compassion, to forgive sin, and ultimately to resurrect the dead and establish the Kingdom of God on earth.

There are few healings recorded in the Old Testament. This may indicate that divine intervention is not necessarily common even when God is working with specific individuals and groups, and promises to be their Healer.

Healing in the Bible is not a simple equation. Faith does not always mean healing. Nor does a lack of restoration indicate a lack of faith. God has <u>always</u> healed for different reasons in different circumstances.

The prophet Elisha was a remarkable individual (2 Kings 2–9). A great number of miracles are recorded in his name. Despite the great powers bestowed, and miracles performed, through God's Spirit, the prophet himself was not healed of some sort of sickness but actually died from it (verse 14). Even after his death, Elisha's bones brought a man back to life (2 Kings 13:21)! Even though he was not to be healed, Elisha never stopped obeying God and he always had faith that God would do what was best. He trusted God completely.

Our Bible story is about a Shunammite woman who had graciously opened her home to provide comfort for Elisha when he traveled through her city. Grateful for her generous hospitality, Elisha wanted to repay her in some way for her great kindness. He was told she had no son, and her husband was old. Elisha told her that she would have a young son within a year. The woman replied "No, my lord. Man of God, do not lie to your maidservant." Perhaps she was afraid to hope. To a woman who yearns for children this is the greatest gift that can be given.

The child was born into the waiting arms of two loving parents. He grew and blessed their lives. One day the young child went to the fields to be with his father. The young boy became ill and complained of his head hurting. He was taken to his mother and died while his mother held him in her lap. When the young boy died, his mother placed him in the room she had built for Elisha and closed the door. She single-mindedly went to find Elisha.

The mother would not give up the precious gift of her son easily. Her actions revealed a strength of commitment. She believed God was in control of the situation and He would bring back her son. She earnestly sought restoration, and was heard.

In addition to her faith, we see God responding to people who trust in Him. People who trusted not in a staff to magically heal, or in Baal, but in the one true God. \Box

The Secret

Confidence in God

Crafty Idea

1. Combine flour, salt, and water. Knead until the dough is smooth and rubbery. Fashion the body of the little boy out of cylinders and balls of the dough. Press the head and limbs onto the body (a few drops of water will make the dough stick). Use a toothpick to etch in the features. Bake the figure on a foil-lined sheet for 1 hour at 275 degrees. Let cool.

2. Flatten pieces of dough into a thin circle and wrap them around the ends of the legs. Gently press down to help figure stand on its own. Bake for one more hour.

3. Let him cool before painting (acrylics work best). Use a scrap of material to fashion his robe, and string to make the sash.



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
