The Teacher's Bible Study

s Christians, we are required to lead a life of personal responsibility and character before God and man. Ours should be a life that is pleasing and obedient to our Creator. We should live a life that enables us to find and reach our greatest personal potential and fulfillment.

There are two overriding principles one should always consider in applying God's law to the everyday cares and pursuits of life:

(1) Christianity is a <u>way</u> of life; and (2) <u>everything</u> we do as Christians should be done as if under the scrutiny of Christ (Colossians 3:17,23).

The world is full of unhappiness. Much unhappiness and personal anxiety occur because of the inability to control one's temper, appetites, impulses, and desires. We have all heard the saying, "Practice makes perfect." Just as we <u>practice</u> to be proficient at our jobs, or anything we are interested in doing well, practice is also needed in building a <u>habit</u> of good behavior.

The theme "self-control" is a difficult concept for young children to understand. Words and stories that teach what is self-control will be used in this series to help you.

As an example, we use this story of Hannah to teach how important it is to keep a promise. It has been discussed in other lessons how God never breaks a promise. We must now teach our children that it is crucial for <u>them</u> to be true to their word. In today's culture, the statement "I didn't mean that," or "I forgot," is common. A Christian should speak the truth and fulfill his or her word to another.

When we shake hands and make an agreement with another individual, it should be as binding as if we wrote a contract; our word is our contract. To not keep your word is a very serious thing in the eyes of God. There is the old adage that says: "Say what you mean, and mean what you say." It's very important to follow through on what you say.

The Hebrew people were slaves in Egypt when God PROMISED to deliver them. God kept that promise, and under the leadership of Moses they left Egypt and headed for the Promised Land. Under Joshua's leadership they conquered much of the land, but not all of it. During the time of the Judges, Israel sank to an all-time low by not obeying God. It is during this dark time in the history of Israel that a baby was born who became their spiritual leader, and the last of the judges of Israel. His name was Samuel.

Elkenah and Hannah had been unable to have children. Hannah was barren. She suffered greatly under the ridicule of Elkenah's other wife. When she made their annual visit to the tabernacle in Shiloh, she made a desperate prayer to God. She promised God that if He gave her a son she would give him back to serve Him.

Her prayer was answered, and when Samuel was weaned, Hannah, being true to her promise, took Samuel to Shiloh where he helped Eli in the tabernacle. In addition, the Lord blessed Hannah with three other sons and two daughters.

Hannah's strength of character is seen in her committment to keeping her promise to God in a beautiful song of praise. Her gratitude in this song expresses her faith in God's power, and the joy she had in her answer to prayer (see "Additional Reading"). \Box

he Bible tells us a story about a man named Elkanah, who had <u>two</u> wives. The one he loved the best was named Hannah, and the other wife was named Peninnah.

The wife Peninnah had been able to have children, while Hannah had none. Spitefully Peninnah would say cruel, mocking things to Hannah, and would laugh at Hannah in her barrenness. It made her cry and feel very sad. One day she was so sad she could not even eat.

Elkanah was very concerned about his good wife, and said: "Hannah, why do you weep? Why do you not eat? And why is your heart grieved? Am I not better to you than TEN sons?"

So Hannah dried her tears and ate a little because she loved her husband, and didn't want to worry him. But her heart was very sad as they traveled to Shiloh to keep the Passover and the Days of Unleavened Bread.

During their visit, Hannah went into the temple to pray one day. She talked to God with her heart, praying silently and fervently with her eyes closed and just barely moving her lips. No sounds came from her mouth. Hannah was unaware that anyone was watching her. But someone did notice her.

That day the high priest Eli sat watching Hannah. So great was her distress he mistakenly thought she was a drunken woman! He spoke sharply to her.

Hannah had made her private, heartfelt plea to God, asking that He give her a baby boy. She promised God that if He did, she would give him back to serve in the tabernacle under the priest Eli. She gave her word on it.

Eli was moved by the young woman's obvious sincerity and her open distress. He told her to go on home, that her plea had been heard.

Hannah dried her tears, thanked Eli, and went away.

That evening Elkanah noticed that his dear Hannah ate her supper, smiled at people easily, and had even privately kissed his cheek and assured him she would be fine now.

Elkanah watched his wife happily because he loved Hannah so very much. She was a good wife and he enjoyed making her happy. He didn't want her sad.

It wasn't long after they went home that Hannah discovered she was going to have a baby. Her happiness was greater than the sadness she had felt.

When the baby was born she named the baby Samuel. She said, "I have aked for him from the LORD!" She gave God praise for her son, because she knew exactly who had sent him to her.

Hannah told Elkanan she would stay home with the baby until Samuel was weaned. Then she would take him to the temple for service. Elkanah agreed.

The End

Crafty Ideas

Let the child choose a rock about the size of a small apple. Wash the rock throughly to remove all dirt, let it dry.

Trace the base of the rock onto a piece of felt. Cut the pattern out of the felt and glue it to the bottom of the rock. Let it dry.

Use permanent markers to write "Our God is the Rock."

Thin white glue with a little bit of water in a saucer and brush over the entire surface of the rock. Rinse the saucer when you finish coating the rock.

Sprinkle the rock with a light dusting of glitter. Let the rock dry thoroughly.

Use as a paper weight.
