Lesson Aim:

To teach children that wisdom comes from *learning* and *doing*. Just to KNOW right from wrong means nothing unless we do the right thing.

The Teacher's Bible Study

od is the ULTIMATE authority on humankind, for He is our Maker. He knows what will make us happy and productive, and what will make us morose and unfruitful. Teaching children how to acquire and use the wisdom found in the written Word of God is a skill they will always need. Encourage your children to develop a God-centered life. This begins by doing what you are doing now sharing a story from the pages of His Word. It is wise indeed to teach them to have reverence for the Bible as God's Word. It is the most valuable gift you can EVER give a child, for the influence of its priceless knowledge is for eternity (Matthew 6:19,20).

Begin by reading the Proverbs together. These little "Reader's Digest" nuggets are short, but the seeds of wisdom are there. Young children love to LEARN! Read a proverb to them, ask them what they think it means, then discuss it. The Bible is a vast library.

I Hear Wisdom Calling

In the Bible, wisdom means learning, common sense, and good judgment. In Exodus 28:3 we read of artists, builders, and those that make clothes being given the spirit of wisdom—you can <u>learn</u> wisdom. In the book of Proverbs, wisdom is applied to many different situations such as: telling the truth, friendship, work, and rearing children. Proverbs 8 describes wisdom as a woman calling people to listen to her and live.

The Old Testament books of Job, Proverbs, and Ecclesiastes are collectively known as the books of wisdom. When King Solomon began his reign as King, he asked God for wisdom and God gladly gave it to him (1 Kings 3:9-14; 10:23,24). It is said in Job 28:20–28 that God is THE *SOURCE OF WISDOM*.

Following the commands of God is a sign of *wisdom*. In the New Testament, Christians are told that if they lack *wisdom*, ask God for it (James 1:5). Paul wrote that "Christ is the power of God and the *wis*-

dom of God" (1 Corinthians 1:24). Find Christ and there is "hidden all the treasures of *wis*-*dom* and knowledge" (Colossians 2:3).

Wisdom calls for knowing right from wrong, and <u>DOING</u> right. Knowledge without action doesn't mean a thing. In fact, when we KNOW to do good and refuse to do it, we are put in the category of "the foolish."

And what happens to the foolish?

It Isn't Wise to Be Foolish

The parable of the ten virgins in Matthew 25 is used to remind us to be ready to go with Christ when He comes. Are we prepared to go the distance?

Notice they were <u>all</u> invited to the wedding supper, <u>all</u> had lamps, <u>all</u> even had oil. Five showed the commitment to be ready no matter how late the bridegroom was in arriving they carried along enough to last throughout the darkness. Five didn't give much thought to the invitation—they didn't bring enough to last through the night, in case it was needed. All were responsible for their own light.

Now is the time to ask God for His wisdom. Now is the time to prepare for the return of Jesus Christ.We are to learn right from wrong in the Word of God, and do what is right. We know that Jesus said He was coming back for us and we can know that He will. Simple as 1,2,3...

It's Dark in Here, Light the Lamp

What Do You See?

Crafty Idea

Remove label from the can. Draw a pattern for the lantern holes with a marker. Fill the can with water and freeze for <u>two</u> days. When the water is frozen solid, place the can on its side on top of a folded towel, and use the nail tips to hammer in holes according to your design.

Adult: Remove the ice (hammered holes will have sharp edges) Screw the hook into the end of the dowel. Create a handle for the can from a wire coat hanger and hook through holes at top of the can.

Carefully melt a bit of wax into the bottom of the can. Fix the candle inside.

Use a match to light the spaghetti noodle and light the votive candle within the can.
